

Women in Air Traffic Control

This afternoon I was talking to my Mother and reminiscing about how things have changed in the last 40 years when it comes to women working. She was commenting about how her brother's wife wanted to work outside the home. She said,



"My brother let her do it, but he insisted they not tell anyone in their social circle because he felt people would think he could not provide for his family."

I understood what she was saying. As a young woman I'd worked summers as a receptionist for my Dad's company and enjoyed the challenges and the sense of accomplishment making a paycheck brought me. My first husband, however, was like my uncle. He felt my place was home with the kids. He said, "You couldn't make enough to pay for the babysitting."

That marriage did not last over five years and as a single Mom I did struggle for awhile, but I had a decent job. Then the President of the United States fired thousands of air traffic controllers.

I won't go into the details of how I got into the job – though if you are curious you can read my memoir, Stress is Relative. But I wanted to take a moment here and talk about how much has changed over time.

Air Traffic Control is not the kind of future most parents present as a possibility to their children, boys or girls. Most of the men I know who entered the profession prior to the strike in 1981 learned of it during their military careers. Some of them had fathers who were controllers.

Although the profession began in the 1920's, the first woman did not enter the picture until 1944. Ruth V. Osgood was a pilot in Chicago and became a controller at Midway Tower when they became short staffed due to WWII. About the same time and for the same reason women were allowed to start working in Flight Service.

Women comprised less than 6% of the entire ATC workforce all the way into the 1980's. Those very unpopular government programs and EEO laws which began with the Civil Rights Act of 1964 have succeeded in bringing the percentage up to 26% as of a few years ago.

Because so few women even know that ATC exists as a career choice, I wanted to showcase the steps I took to get into this highly lucrative field. In many ways it is an ideal job for women and for those who have mobility issues because it requires intelligence and quick decision making rather than raw strength.

Many times over the years I've thought that executive secretaries, scout leaders, or mothers of large families would make good Air Traffic controllers because they are used to keeping track of and directing the movements of groups of people all going different directions. ATC requires that skill along with practical knowledge of how computers function and a good general learning aptitude.


One of the most important elements a woman needs is a good sense of self, an inner strength and the ability to weather the challenges and disappointments as well as the successes of the job.

I was lucky. Mom and Dad had five girls and one son. Unlike many parents they never told any of their children that they could not pursue whatever profession they wished. As a result my sisters went into the fields of law enforcement, medicine, corporate payroll management, and one is an internationally known artist. My degree was in non-profit management – how I got into ATC was pretty much a fluke. How I stayed with it took a lot of work.

During the past 34 years I have watched women become accepted as competent in a challenging profession. The percentage of women is growing as they realize the profession exists. I'd still like to see some pilot Barbie dolls, or some other way of introducing women to the delights of flight early in life.

Tell your daughters from me, ATC is challenging, but worth it!
