Reading Winter Radar

On my way home from Oshkosh Air Venture in August I observed the billowing anvils of thunderstorms south of my flight path. Both the radar and satellite pictures showed buildups advancing northward which would cut directly


through my route, so I took the safe option and landed at Dalhart, Texas for the night.

Winter Radar and satellite pictures are not as easy to read or interpret. All the images shown with this article were captured at the same time. Let's see what they say

about a potential flight from Redwood Falls (RWF) in western Minnesota to Minneapolis (MSP). Assume the performance ceiling of your aircraft is up to 13,500 feet MSL maximum.

An AIRMET exists over the central half of the flight for Icing from the freezing level – near the surface - to 11,000 feet. When you get briefings from Flight Service, they are required by the National Weather Service to inform you of any AIRMETs within 3,000 feet altitude of your flight level, because their estimates are just that – estimates.

During winter, the biggest problem with individual Radar sites, like the one shown here, is the levels of precipitation are deceptive in two ways. This picture shows a large area of green and yellow which



is already east of the destination - which in the summer months is associated with light to moderate lower level precipitation, something most pilots find easy to fly through or get around.

Radar has a harder time picking up snow and ice than it does rain. During the winter time the thin pale blues and greys present a subtly sinister reading. Even a pale cloud of grey – like the one that covers the route from RWF to MSP, could mean there is light precipitation in the area – and flying through it could cause ice accumulation. A smudge of light to deep blue can mean more significant icing is possible or that a small intense snowstorm is blowing through an area. Just because it is small does not mean it is harmless.

If you are using WSI or some other private vendor for your radar products the colors may be altered by their computers — in most cases they will show winter radars that have green for rain, pink for a rain/ice mix, and blue for snow. The worst thing you can fly through is a rain/ice mix — that is where you catch the heaviest icing on an aircraft. Be sure to become familiar with the variations of each different weather vendors radar interpretations.

The Winter radar mosaic here shows the areas of precipitation as being more widespread than the Summer weather radar mode

Getting used to the seasonal differences in radar takes a bit of practice. Keep in mind that where summer images are stark and dramatically colored, winter's colors are more subtle, but integral to safely planning long distance flights.


