Flying Club Update Art Woods

The club continues to revise the bylaws to ensure that the members are comfortable with them and to comply with New Mexico non-profit regulations. We appreciate the help of our Chapter 179 treasurer, Ryan Carson, who also happens to be an attorney!!

Currently eight individuals are committed to funding the Club to enable completion of the RV12. Insurance coverage is for student pilots through ATP! We will have 2-3 instructors on the policy for doing check-outs and other training pertinent to LSA aircraft.

The estimated cost for a flying (polished aluminum) RV12 with a glass panel is \$85,000 so initial membership cost is between \$8,500 and \$10,000. Estimated monthly cost is \$100/month per member for hangar, insurance and maintenance. Usage cost is estimated to be \$45—55 per flight hour including fuel.

Anyway, 5 days on this luxury yacht was amazing, and we went north, almost to Mackinac Island and then returned to Manistee to get back in the Velocity.

But, the next leg was a flight that has always been on my bucket list; flying the Emerald Coast from Panama City to Pensacola FL.
