On March 1, the Board met via videoconference with 9 participants. Here's a summary of discussions.

The March chapter gathering is traditionally focused on scholarship presentations and meeting recipient's families. We decided to host a Saturday reception for these presentations starting this year, in lieu of our normal 3rd Tuesday gathering. The reception will be March 26 at the Reimer Hangar.

We reviewed a proposal in detail and approved our spending budget for the year. Key changes are mainly related to hangar ownership and event operations that have changed over the last couple years. Our main spending continues towards chapter scholarships.

Mark Sturm reported that the selection committee met and notifications are underway for our 2022 chapter scholarship program. We attracted terrific applicants and are excited to announce those in the coming weeks!

Jim Kessler is accepting DEAA applications and conducted a kickoff meeting in February. He expects to step aside after 2022 so we will need a new DEAA leader for 2023.

We note that although we have attracted more youth to chapter gatherings in the last few years, they don't return. We discussed ideas on how to engage teens on a regular basis, beyond Young Eagles flights. We get excited about ideas but need someone that could lead the charge. Food for thought. Volunteer needs continue. Our dreams extend well beyond our practical ability to implement. February Gathering – Recap (continued) Dennis Kirby – My Rebel Build Project

Dennis Kirby presented a most entertaining story - "My Rebel Build Project". Here are highlights.

Dennis began by giving us a history of his building and flying experiences. He built a Kolb,1997-2002, and enjoyed flying it around New Mexico for 14 years.



He sold the Kolb in 2016 and acquired a Citabria. In 2017 he experienced an unwelcome incident – an off-field landing. Salvaged the motor (to be used later).



Next project – a Murphy Rebel, wings and fuselage mostly completed.



380 hrs





He needed a place to continue project. An off-theshelf shed was purchased and modified for the purpose (he noted that the idea was not original).









Building commenced with sheet metal work (baffling), piping (exhaust) and some adaptation of off-the-shelf materials – note the Custom Air Intake. Work continued through the winters, snow or shine.

February was a very busy month for scholarships. Our application closing date was 15 Feb and we now have several outstanding young candidates to look at for 2022. Our evaluation committee has some tough decisions to make. We should have an announcement to make by mid-March. Thanks to all who applied.

As I mentioned here previously, our local EAA Chapter 179 is planning to offer four \$2,000 scholarships in 2022. Also, I just received word from EAA national that our chapter request for a 2022 Ray scholarship

has been granted for a full \$10,000 Scholarship (our 3rd)! So, that's possibly \$18,000 in scholarships for 2022!!

A Special Chapter 179 Scholarship Reimer Memorial Scholarship

The Reimer Memorial Scholarship is awarded to a chapter scholarship recipient with aviation aspirations who demonstrate a spirit of volunteerism. It is an EAA Chapter 179 scholarship, to be presented in the memory of Randy and Susie Reimer, two of the most generous, creative, and hardworking chapter volunteers in our history. Randy and Susie embodied EAA's Spirit of Aviation and volunteerism, enriching EAA 179's youth and public activities.



Randy and Susie moved from Wisconsin to the Albuquerque area after retirement where Randy completed his lifelong goal of building his airplane. Susie and their grandchildren participated in the build, with Susie earning the name, "Susie the Riveter". They immediately became active in the aviation community, ultimately taking over our chapter food service for public events including Young Eagles pancake breakfasts, Land of Enchantment Fly-In breakfast and lunch, and EAA Air Tours hosting the B-17 or TriMotor. They shaped much of how the Double Eagle Aviation Academy runs today.

Randy was a career electrician in Wisconsin. Susie was an entrepreneur, owner of Susie's Works of Heart crafts and known for her baking ability and spoiling her grandchildren.

On the airport, Randy was known to drop whatever he was doing to help anyone. He shared his tools, expertise, and time plus his sense of humor even when facing a tough problem. Susie's thoughtfulness and entrepreneurship added class to our events, bringing new ideas that only she could think up. She made things happen, always enlisting Randy's help. Besides sharing their time and skills, they recruited other volunteers including fellow Lions Club members.

This award will honor the Reimers' commitment to inspire the next generation of aviators and their love of the aviation community. The scholarship is made possible by memorial donations from the Reimer family, life-long friends, and chapter friends.

The Jay Schmitt Memorial Scholarship

Enabling the Next Generation of Aviators

This message is from Jay Schmitt's wife, Joyce Schmitt, to recipients. Jay's history of aviation activities is an inspiration to everyone with an interest in aviation.

"The scholarship you have been awarded is in memory of Jay Schmitt. Jay loved all things aviation! He would be particularly happy to see the impressive, young people who are pursuing their own path in aviation.

Jay's own path began when, as a young boy, he won blue ribbons for the rocket models he entered in the New Mexico state fair! He received his private pilot certificate when he was 23 years old. Jay went to optometry school in Fullerton, California and while there he relieved stress by heading to the desert on weekends and flying his powered hang glider.

Upon returning to New Mexico, Jay continued his interest in flying. He continued to study and train, obtaining Instrument and Commercial ratings. He spent a great deal of study time and a week in Texas and obtained A & P Certificate so he could work on his own aircraft.

Jay was always in pursuit of a new adventure and that was manifest in his owning (either alone or with a partner) and learning to fly a variety of planes. Over the years, Jay owned and flew a Cessna 172, Swift, Cessna 310, Bellanca, Smith Miniplane, Cassutt Experimental Racer, Esqual, and Sonex.

Jay had great admiration for the friends he met through EAA, hanging out at airports, and joining pilot lunches. He always marveled at all he learned from having conversations with his aviation friends.

Jay would be nothing but encouraging as you pursue your interest in aviation and wish you the very best as you move ahead on your journey."

Folks have been busy in our hangar. It is easy to see the work continuing on the RV-12 by members of the High Desert Flyers Association. In parallel, though, there as been a lot of time and effort towards sorting tools, material, parts, and "other stuff".

- Lee Otto provides a "scheme" for organizing the things so they are accessible and usable, to have a place for each thing, to put parts and materials where one can find them. And designate places for or tools, where they are easy to retrieve hand tools and where there is working space and easy access to fixed tools.
- Meg Fleming is working hard on sorting "the stuff" into classes: tools (sockets, wrenches, pliers, hammers, etc,) and materials (wires, nuts and bolts, tape, and on and on). She is gradually identifying a designated place for each class of things with hopes 1) that people will be able to locate what they need



easily, and 2) that things get returned to their designated place. To help us all, she is putting labels on the respective storage locations.

Presently the hangar is usually open when one of the members involved in building the RV-12 is at work, typically Monday thru Thursday. Other plans for the hangar are in the works. We expect soon to have a sign on the building identifying it as the hangar for EAA 179. This is a work-in-progress; organization of the Hangar will evolve over time as what we have on hand is categorized and as patterns of use evolve.

RV-12 Build Project High Desert Flyers

As reported last month, the Chapter's RV-12 Build project is now in the hands of the High Desert Flyers Association. Building continues with Stephen Fleming attending to installation of the motor and Mike Rehberg working the avionics. Others are assisting, in particular Lee Otto's expertise and handiwork is being provided in many ways. Others lending a hand include Doug Dingman, Dave Otero, Fred Loehr, me, and ... apologies if I've overlooked someone.

Progress is going apace:

- Motor (Stephen Fleming): After a few weeks of work, the various fittings, accessories, and hoses have been attached to the motor. Then attention turned to the fuselage installation of the motor and some modifications required to bring the fuselage up to current specifications. The motor was hung in mid-January and work now proceeds to make connections between the motor and the fuselage (fuel lines, engine controls and instruments, etc.
- Avionics (Mike Rehberg): The avionics equipment is in hand. Work now







proceeds to get it installed. The fuselage was built for a configuration of avionics that was "modern" in its time, but is no longer available. So modifications are required to the instrument panel and the mounting tray for the displays, controls, and electronic boxes. This work is proceeding apace.

In hopes that there are 'newcomers' to this world of aviation who will also be reading our Newsletter, I plan to synopsize them in coming issues. The comments are solely my own, sometimes more informed than at other times. I welcome comments from anyone such as why one or another appeals (or doesn't appeal) to you, how you use them for your 'education', provide updated information, or otherwise. I will publish updates as you provide more information or insight into them.

New Mexico Pilots Association (NMPA)

I recently flew down to Grant County airport (SVC) with Lanny Tonning to attend a breakfast board meeting of NMPA. I learned a lot about their activities and projects that support aviation in New Mexico.

- They may be best known for their work to return to service backcountry airstrips around New Mexico. NMPA's members are very active in working with BLM, USFS, land owners, local communities, and the New Mexico Department of Aviation.
 - For example, they host weekend 'work parties' throughout the year to do the sometimes hard work of clearing obstacles, preparing strips to be useable, and performing maintenance to keep them that way. Through their efforts, a number of airstrips are now available for those wanting to 'get away'. (BTW: not all of their activities are back-country—the Amigos del Cielo Fly-in, which includes activities at Lordsburg, is on an airstrip that I would not consider –backcountry.)
- NMPA is a "Voice of General Aviation in New Mexico". It has a place at the table with NMDOT's Aviation Division to represent General Aviation in Santa Fe. And they often take up issues with the FAA and other governmental agencies. They stay abreast of opportunities to further our interests,
 - For example, they are tracking a current proposal to expand the MOA that covers part of southwest New Mexico and Arizona. They have provided comments to the FAA and will continue to represent the interests of GA to minimize the impacts on our use of the airspace.
- They promote aviation safety via training and education programs, including offering clinics and reference material through which pilots can refine their skills. Check out their monthly Newsletter.

This is just an overview of NMPA's contributions to promote general aviation in New Mexico. Check out their web site, <u>New Mexico Pilots Association</u> (nmpilots.org). And perhaps you might become a member and help NMPA serve us all.

Fly New Mexico (a Facebook Group)

For those of you who ply Facebook, here's a Group that caters to sharing information more local to New Mexico. Started by Dave Otero, also part of NMPA, it provides a place to share information, stories, announcement, etc. among group members and the Facebook public. For example, a questions was posted inquiring about "..fun place to fly in southern NM or west TX?". It garnered 36 comments, <u>Fly New Mexico</u> on Facebook.

The Aviators Lounge (a Facebook Group)

This is a great group on Facebook. Posts often present current newsworthy information, flying experiences, glimpses into aviation history, and occasionally humor. <u>The Aviators Lounge</u>.

eMail Subscriptions

I subscribe to a few eMail publications, allowing me to scan through them for topics of interest at the time. If like me, you get an avalanche of messages, I segregate them with a separate eAddresses for certain categories. One could also set up filters to move messages into separate folders, say by topic. Here are a couple subscriptions that may be of interest:

- KitPlanes: Today the topic was "E is For Electric... and Experimental!", plus "Cuitting and Shaping Angle Aluminum".
- Pilot Workshops: Yesterday's topic was "Using a Callsign on CTAF".
- SocialFlight: What's going on in aviation around the country and the world.
- And of course the eMail that is sent by organizations in which I am a member: EAA, AOPA, etc.
