Mark Chappell (23) first gained his interest in aviation at the first Double Eagle Aviation Adventure in 2014. Mark continued his interest in aviation when he ioined the New Mexico Civil Air Patrol as a cadet. Through his CAP career. Mark rose to the rank of Cadet Major while serving as the wing Director of Training for Unmanned Aircraft.

Mark was deployed to Puerto Rico in January 2020 as part of an interdisciplinary team of UAS (unmanned aerial systems - drone) operators with the Federal Emergency Management Agency in response to major earthquakes. Mark graduated with his Bachelor of Applied Arts and Sciences in Emergency Management from Eastern New Mexico University.

In March of 2022, he joined the New Mexico Department of Homeland Security and Emergency Management as an Operations Officer. During the 2022 New Mexico Wildfire Season, the worst in New Mexican history, Mark served as the Director of the State Emergency Operations Center, coordinating the state's response to the wildfires. In June 2022, President Biden visited the New Mexico Emergency Operations Center, where Mark briefed him on the current status of the wildfires and what the state was doing in response to them.

During "blue skies" Mark used geographic information systems (GIS) to maintain statewide situational awareness, creating maps, apps, and dashboards to track what is happening around the state. He also manages the agency's public safety UAS Program and satellite imagery and intelligence program.

These monthly Chapter Gatherings offer time to network with programs centered on exchanging experiences and ideas about aviation - airplanes, flying, and flying activities - rather than the chapter business which is addressed in bimonthly Board meetings.

January Chapter Gathering - RECAP Jovce Woods

Chapter member, Young Eagles pilot, and real estate developer Kenny Hinkes shared an update on the "Midfield Development Project at AEG". Sharing his aviation background, we learned Kenny was a charter pilot with Cutter and only went into real estate to be able to be home more after his son Jack was born.



Kenny said that Jack never was interested to learn to fly although family trips often were aboard small aircraft. Like many kids growing up falling asleep in the back, he took flying for granted, seemingly no different than travelling by car.



Then one day, Jack started talking about learning to fly. Kenny didn't believe he was serious for some time. Finally in 2019, Jack convinced him to buy the beautiful red Cessna 172 that they are flying today. Kenny joined Chapter 179, began flying Young Eagles, and teaching Jack to fly. Since then, Jack got his private pilot license and is working on his instrument and commercial ratings. Kenny expressed what great joy it has



been, helping his son on this flying journey.

The Double Eagle II Airport hangar project that he and his son Jack have been working on is called "High Flying Hangars". There are five phases planned with the first row of 50' x 60' box hangars expected to be built in 2023. Subsequent hangars will be smaller, with the second row at 50'x50' and 40' x 50'. February Board Meeting

Joyce Woods, Secretary

Your chapter Board met 2/13/2023 for a special business meeting. President Jim Kessler presided. Key agenda items were to confirm scholarship funding and decide about whether to move forward with the chapter hangar reservation and fundraising. Here's a summary of discussion and actions. Please feel free to contact any board member if you have questions or input!

• Art Woods reported that membership renewals (59) are just over halfway to where we were at year end 2022 (113 members). *(See the <u>membership note on page 5.)</u>*

• John Dewitt reported on fund balances for our three accounts: Chapter general fund, Chapter Scholarship account, and the EAA Ray Scholarship account. He reviewed a proposed Chart of Accounts establishing codes to track various financial categories, to be confirmed at March Board meeting. It was decided that in-kind donations should be reported as "income" and balanced in the books as "costs" so we have record of our true costs. Generous members donate not only their time but also often pay for expenses for which they don't request reimbursement. We should track those costs and recognize donors.

• Our next gathering will be at a restaurant, M'Tuccis Moderna in Rio Rancho, rather than at the airport. *Winter warmth assured! (See <u>details on page 4.</u>)*

• Mark Sturm reviewed scholarship data and presented a proposed budget for 2023. In the last 4 years, we've awarded 27 scholarships: Chapter Scholarships, Ray Scholarship, and EAA Air Academy. He reviewed past recipient progress and reported that with 2 days before our 2023 deadline, we have not received as many applications as in past years. Considering the success of the Ray Scholarship program, members suggested ideas to consider for how we might modify our program in the future.

• Hangar options outlined by a subcommittee's Resource Strategy report were considered. The Board decided to withdraw the hangar reservation made on our behalf with the AEG High Flying Hangars development. The main concern is establishing enough justification for owning and managing our own building. Currently, our usage would be for monthly gatherings, IMC Club meetings, and Board or committee meetings and perhaps annual DEAA and/or LOEFI usage. Additional concerns needing resolution are the ease of public access to that area and the significant fund raising required in a short time.

• Dan Fuka reported on the February Young Eagles event. If more pilots would confirm in advance, we could accept more registrations. Next event is March 4.

• Board approved using a free Southwest Airlines ticket for a raffle at LOEFI 2023. The Alderete family gained credit for volunteer time and assigned it for our use as a fundraiser.

• The Board approved signing up with Lightspeed for their program benefiting chapters sponsoring EAA Ray Scholars. Lightspeed will donate 10% for any headset purchased with our chapter code (TBA).

Our official chapter address will soon be changing to a Double Eagle II Airport address. Stay tuned, it's been a SLOW process with many USPS visits by Emilio and Jim.

On a personal note: last week I had my first ride in the RV-12. (Many thanks to the Chapter for bringing this project along so that the High Desert Flyers Association could then take it to the finish line.

Through the generosity of Art Woods, I had the chance to fly in Joyce's C-172 and to start rekindling the 'muscle memory' for maneuvering flight and the mental memory for procedures and communications. With that recent experience, I was a bit better prepared to demonstrate some of my (rusty) pilot prowess (under Lee Otto's supervision).

I flew LSA's back in '18 and '19 (Remos GX and Tecnam P2002), so I was somewhat familiar with a plane like the RV-12. Many of it's features felt familiar: light touch on the controls, smooth ride (unless the air is a bit bumpy), easy approach-path control to landing (watch for ground effect beneath those low wings), and simple cockpit management. My learning curve will be adjusting to the comprehensive display of information on the Dynon panel (a challenge after 60 years flying six-packs).

It feels very good to be back in the left seat again.

Our scholarship application process opened 1 January and closes 15 February.

• I am hoping that this year our chapter will have funding to support four \$2,000 scholarships, and that

we will be fortunate enough to be awarded our 7th \$10,000 Ray Scholarship from EAA!

• Additionally, we have made reservations for two (ages 16 - 18) to attend the Advanced Air Academy at Air Venture in 2023.

These are great opportunities for young future flyers. I'd ask that you readers of this newsletter consider if you know any young people who are interested in learning to fly, or becoming an A&P mechanic, or an ATC controller, or attending the Advanced Air Academy. Pilots needed! March 4th is our next event, and we can keep adding Young Eagles as pilots can commit earlier. Please watch your email for invites with a link to commit, or contact Daniel at YoungEagles@eaa179.org.

Our February 4th event was a private event for the LOEFI 2022 Volcano Vista Marching Band and makeup for the Young Eagles who didn't get to fly due to the November event cancelation. We were able to open up 54 reservations based on the number of Pilots who pre-committed, and **47 YEs showed up to fly, 23 of whom had never flown in a small GA aircraft before!**

This is a great start to the year and <u>EAA YE 30th Anniversary Challenge</u> which gives double credit to EAA179 through July 31st. All flights given from January 1, 2023, to July 31, 2023 qualify EAA179 double Young Eagles credits (\$10 per Young Eagle)! If you were not aware, the EAA Young Eagles credit program awards a \$5 (\$10 from January 1 - July 31, 2023) to pilots and chapters for each Young Eagle flown in a calendar year. EAA179 uses the credits to send young persons to the EAA Air Academy or to support and enhance their local Young Eagles outreach efforts.

YE flight dates in 2023 will be <u>March 4th, April 2, May 7, Sept 10,</u> <u>Oct 15, and Nov. 5</u>. We are going to push for as many pilots and YEs as possible during the spring event as EAA National is doubling our event credits which have been allowing us to send YEs to EAA's Air Academy events.

For the pilots, the <u>EAA Young Eagles 30 Flights for 30 Years</u> campaign is rolling. Any pilots who fly 30 Young Eagles this year through July 31, 2023, will be awarded a commemorative Young Eagles 30th -Anniversary polo shirt.

Adult Eagles!

The greatest hurdle in learning to fly is claimed to be finishing the ground school, so some of Albuquerque's EAA members are working with other aviation enthusiasts in gathering for Study Buddy FAA Knowledge Exam get-togethers downtown at the community MakerSpace QueLab. (QueLab is an adult hobbies playground extraordinaire with machine, welding, wood, sewing shops, and more). We

have a classroom on 7th and Haines (near the New Mexico Steam Locomotive 2926) with shorter driving distances from most of the ABQ population.

Last year's ground school Study Buddy group has helped over a dozen obtain their ground school endorsements, and the endorsed from last year are getting together to study to complete the FAA Exam over the next few weeks. Several in the group are **ALREADY** LTA pilots and are working toward their fixed-wing certifications! Our Ground School support group for old and young, EAA member or not, happens every Wednesday at 6pm. Contact Daniel Fuka to get on the list.

This group realized it needed an airplane if they are going to be able to fly more frequently and has been recovering the tail feathers and replacing hardware on a Challenger II E-LSA, N135JG. Here are some pictures from the fun of folks learning how to put fabric onto control surfaces! Yep, and we are having a BBQ every Saturday at 1pm while getting these skins updated, so come join us for the fun!
