Notes from our President Jim Kessler



We had a fantastic Gathering at M'Tucci's on February 21st. There were about 40 people in attendance, and we learned about the New Mexico's use of Unmanned Aerial Vehicle's for a number of projects.

Our Young Eagles Rally on March 4th was a huge success. We had 12 pilots and 90 kids. Dan Fuka has done a great job with this program. The process was very well organized. Also a big thanks to all the pilots and ground crew who man-

aged the hoard of people all morning. A special thanks to Alex Carothers for his consistent help at registration.

There is an Air Force Career Day at the end of March. We will get some great exposure during that event. The Air Force is bringing several of their Special Operations aircraft that they fly at Kirtland AFB out to Double Eagle. We plan to have a table with flyers and a science fair board showing the different classes and hands-on activities we do at Double Eagle Aviation Academy (DEAA). We'll also have a simulator set up for the students to try out. We'll need some help with that. If you are available March 31st let me know.

We have opened up applications for DEAA. I foresee a robust application season this year. DEAA is a week-long introduction into topics related to aviation, scheduled for June $5 - 9^{\text{th}}$. It officially starts on Monday at 9:00 with a demonstrated aircraft preflight to small groups of students. However, the day starts earlier with aircraft displays on the ramp and discussions with the pilots who own them.

During the week we instruct in aviation weather, aircraft instrumentation, communications, navigation, weight & balance, aerodynamics and much more. It is a fun week for students who are interested in careers in the aviation field. We'll have career speakers on maintenance, engineering, UAV operations, and military careers.

I encourage those who know someone who might be interested to get their application in early this year. DEAA is for age 14 to 17. Applications can be downloaded from the chapter website.

We've had our first meeting of the DEAA volunteers, and everything is on schedule. There is still room in the schedule for more volunteers if you are interested. (See the DEAA poster on <u>page 14</u> and more info on our web site <u>eaa179.org/deaa</u>.)

Program: EAA 179's 2023 Scholarship Presentations , Mark Sturm

Meet recipients of Chapter 179 scholarship awards! Always inspiring, join us to meet students and learn about their aviation goals. Expect to meet parents and let's see what we may do to help these youth move forward along their aviation journeys.

This year, we present two \$2000 flight training scholarships, one in honor of "Doc" Weaver* and the ongoing Jay Schmitt Memorial Scholarship. Two students will be awarded full tuition to attend EAA's Air Academy in Oshkosh this summer. In addition, four recipients will be awarded \$1000 each for various flight training pursuits.

Our program supports youth up to age 25 pursuing aviation education. Thanks to our generous donors, Chapter 179 has awarded over \$60,000 in scholarships over the past 5 years.

These monthly Chapter Gatherings offer time to network with programs centered on exchanging experiences and ideas about aviation – air-planes, flying, and flying activities – rather than the chapter business which is addressed in bimonthly Board meetings.

Mark Chappell Likes Maps!

Gathering at the M'Tucci's restaurant off airport for our first time, we had a great crowd! Mark Chappell presented. Our connection with him goes back to his attending the 2014 Double Eagle Aviation Adventure. He also attended EAA's Air Academy in OSH. He became active in the Mexico Civil Air Patrol as a cadet and rose to the rank of Cadet Major while serving as the wing Director of Training for Unmanned Aircraft.



Now gainfully employed by NM Dept of Homeland

Security and Emergency Management, Mark shared fun stories of his journey, while providing insight on advancements of drones and GIS mapping.

He shared his 2020 experience in Puerto Rico with FEMA as a cadet using drones to assess earthquake damage and respond to the emergency. They monitored refugee tent setup and reported on contractor progress.

This led to coordinating the state's use of drones in response in the 2022 wildfires, when 1% of the state burned. They tracked fire locations with data compiled from a mix of manned and unmanned aircraft. Mark monitored the TFR during the June 2022 presidential visit with a Secret Service person assigned to him. At 23 years old, he briefed the president on their work.

Chapter attendees were impressed by the sophistication of results from combining map technologies of infrared, moisture, ground type, and the resolution currently available. Mark answered questions about technologies and capabilities of drones including battery and solar powered, and the progression to a mandate for ADSB for new drones.

With a nasty windstorm forecast for the next day, Mark used maps to explain the severe weather warnings $\,$ - which became a reality!

Your board is up and running with several new members! Here's a summary:

- John DeWitt, chapter Treasurer reported account balances has brought accounting experience, providing structure. Art, Lance and Jim will review 2022 books with John for learning, and to serve as our annual audit. The Board allocated EAA Young Eagles credits to help pay for 2023 Air Academy tuition scholarships.
- Dan Fuka, Young Eagles Coordinator reported on the successful March 4 rally. Since it's always a challenge estimating YE registration capacity based on early pilot commitments, Art Woods and Lance Hunter are calling a Young Eagles pilot meeting in March to review procedures and get pilot input for improvements.

- EAA has expanded a past 1 day event to a "Learn to Fly Week" with daily webinars, May 15-19. They encourage chapters to present an in-person "Flying Start" seminar on Saturday, May 20 followed by Eagle Flights. To do so, we need an event leader, coordination with available CFIs, and volunteer pilots.
- The Board is interested in improving our RAF hangar. Current ideas include insulation and ventilation for better year round use. Jim Kessler will work with Lee Otto, Lance Hunter, and others to explore ideas.
- DEAA plans are underway. We need to identify a LOEFI Committee Chair and get it launched soon.

Two additional areas we need volunteers to expand our reach and spread the load.

• Youth Outreach Coordinator: Someone to serve as the focal point for occasional requests such as participation in the March 15 John Adams Middle School Career Fair or connecting with groups such as JROTC, CAP, Scouts, or homeschool groups.

• **Program Committee Members:** Plan monthly gatherings, including arranging for an aviation presenter and the venue. Ensure setup/cleanup is covered. Provide newsletter announcements prior and Recap articles. If we could spread amongst 3-4 people, each would only have a few months to organize.

On Becoming Old Pilots Jim Kessler



I flew my Bi-annual Flight Review today. That got me to thinking about aviation safety.

There is an old saying in aviation that goes like this, "There are old pilots and bold pilots, but there are no old bold pilots."

I've been flying for over 40 years and the older I get the more that old saying has shown its veracity. But one thing is also clear. The aviation community is learning from the mistakes we have made. What makes that possible is that we are brutally honest with ourselves. As a result of this brutal honesty we have seen the enemy and he is us.

So I want to take this newsletter to remind everyone that we all want to become old pilots.

I'll be the first to tell you that "God watches over fools and drunk" and I wasn't drunk at the time so ... I'm writing this as one who has on occasion put himself in a precarious situation and learned much from it.

What I've learned is that at some point in the process of getting into that precarious situation I thought to myself, "Is this a good idea?" So I knew I was about to test my skill/luck as an aviator. If you find yourself thinking you are about to test your skill as an aviator, take the other path. Many an aviator has not passed the test.

There are a couple of situations that aviators find themselves in that cause them to decide to test their skills/luck. One of the most overpowering is "Get-Home-itis." This is generally a cross country situation. It is a disease of the mind that says I have a schedule to keep and therefore testing my skills is worth the risk. Do not let the perceived importance of your schedule deceive you into a dangerous situation. There are solutions to Get-Home-itis; leave yourself a day or so in your schedule for delays, be prepared to be late or plan a more reliable means of transportation. Set it in your mind that being late is an acceptable outcome or by a ticket on an airline (perhaps not Southwest).

Now for the brutally honest part. Our chapter has been deeply affected by the syndrome of Get-Home-itis. We are still waiting for the Final NTSB accident report on Randy and Suzie Riemer's fatal accident. But much can be learned from the preliminary report.

The weather was marginal or worse. Randy was a fairly low time pilot. The flight path indicates a case of vertigo resulting in a spiral descent into the terrain. The airplanes velocity was high enough to spread the debris over two hundred feet and tear the wings off in tree covered terrain. The engine was found about 80 feet beyond the main wreckage.

This is not a time to point fingers but rather to say "there but for the grace of God go I."

Don't find yourself in the position of depending on the grace of God. If you are not confident in your ability to complete the objective, make sure you have another pilot that can assist you or better yet don't go.

Instrument flight in GA aircraft should be considered an emergency unless you are qualified <u>and</u> conscientiously maintaining currency. Flight in IMC is a very perishable skill. From my experience it takes an instrument qualified pilot who has not been conscientious about 10 minutes to reestablish their scan and get comfortable again. That is more than enough time to get yourself in trouble.

Let's all do our best to become old pilots.
