LOEFI is looming large before us. We



# August Chapter Gathering - RECAP Art Woods

Air Academy recipients Mia Alderete and William Reese shared photos and stories from their experience in Oshkosh for a week long camp and their first exposure to EAA's AirVenture. Also attending the Gathering was our first Ray Scholar, Rowan Phlieger, who reported she is transitioning from her charter pilot job at CSI to her first "Jet Job" at NetJets. So rewarding to hear from each of them!

Several attendees shared Air Venture photos which were cycled on screen. We celebrated our chapter's 60th anniversary with cake!

Art's synopsis of the Woods' 2023 "AirVenture Adventures":

The 2-3 day forecast called for clear sailing for Friday before Oshkosh. So why do we wake up at 0430 and see 300 to 500 overcast skies across eastern New Mexico extending to Kansas?? Plan B was wait a while. Didn't work; too impatient!! Plan C is go IFR when the ceilings lift "some", which did cooperate by 1000. Even found a lower altitude routing at 12000 feet across the Sandias. And filed that which was accepted by FAA's all-knowing computer. Well, except it wasn't (10 minutes after we were driving to the airport). Accepted 30 minutes at 13000 from SAF to FTI. On top of the clouds. Descended into Great Bend, KS and went through a little cloud. Clear sailing to our next stop and even clearer into Oshkosh.

ADS-B showed the normal conga line of airplanes using the arrival routing. By the time we got to the initial transition point, there was nobody in front of us for miles. Doesn't anybody like flying with us to RIPON and FISKE?? Landed, taxied and parked in a record 10 minutes. Amazing.

Our week was mostly volunteering at the Blue Barn – EAA's devoted chapter resource building. Cooked for the chapter leaders corn roast Sunday night and found out what it's like to cook 480 hamburgers and a few dozen hotdogs.

With a plane parked outside the whole week, we also endured the normal downpours, gusty wind alerts and tornado and hail warnings. But N7VD survived.

We also toured the ENTIRE AirVenture grounds – by foot, on trams, in buses and sometimes a lucky golf cart ride. The tour included visiting the experimental kit builder's area. And I found a kit manufacturer from my hometown of Montrose, CO. Now if I can only talk Joyce into building Kay's Speedster – a nifty modern two place, radial engine with classic lines from the 1930's racers. Gorgeous!! And "easy" to build.

Packed it up early Friday to head home and taxied to the runway at 0700. And our ZIA tail was met by our friend Ken Summer's Zia tail on his Glastar. Nice farewell from a great week at AirVenture.

# From the Young Eagles Nest

While several of our members made their annual return to Oshkosh, two of our younger members were able to experience it for the first time. Mia Alderete and William Reese were both awarded a Chapter 179 scholarship to attend the week-long Advanced Air Academy. Both reported having had a truly remarkable time while there.

If you attended our August meeting at BJ's restaurant on the 15<sup>th</sup> you got to see just how ex-

cited they were to experience <u>Air Venture</u> as they both had presentations of their experiences. Boy did we select the best to represent our chapter. If you were unable to attend, below I share with you a note William sent me describing his time at camp and the big show.

During my time at EAA Advanced Air Academy, I got to meet many like-minded people who have a passion for aviation as well, like pursuing a career as an airline pilot, air traffic controller, mechanic, and more! 

Editor: Emilio forwarded the following update to his Skykote project. Those who have already built an airplane will relate easily to the original article, and to his update. And the rest of us ... no doubt all of us will admire the perseverance, knowledge and skills developed, and ultimately – An Airplane wrought with one's own hands. Congratulations, Emilio. Here is his update:

I wanted to share some news about the Skyote that might interest you and our Newsletter readers.

With the help of several very generous Chapter 179 members, I was able to get the Skyote moved from my garage/shop to a hangar at Double Eagle on Friday morning, 8/9/2023. Raymond Alderete, his daughter Mia, Dan Horschel, his son Scott, and Brian Morrison came to help make the trip possible. Raymond and Brian each brought a long, flat and low trailer to make the loading and off-loading as easy as possible. It took slightly more than an hour to get everything loaded up and tied down, ready for the road







While I did not supply a trailer myself, the bed and cab of my truck were packed with other tools and paraphernalia that I thought we might need to start the assembly process once we arrived at the hangar. My normal 30-minute drive took about forty minutes this time. We had a procession of four vehicles and associated trailers slowly moving from my house in the NE area of town to Double Eagle Airport, mostly traveling on Paseo del Norte at a very sedate pace of 40 MPH, with all flashers blinking!

Once at the hangar (Blue 10), everything was offloaded carefully and moved into the hangar. I am happy to report that nothing was scratched or otherwise damaged at all! Since we had the manpower available and willing to work a bit longer, it was suggested that we proceed with the assembly process. And that's exactly what we did. As you can see, the upper wing panels were attached after some grunting and groaning, finally secured with the proper hardware.





The lower wing panels will be attached in much the same way, but unlike the upper wings, the aileron torque tube has to be attached to the lower wing aileron first. Once the torque tube is attached to the aileron, the lower wing is slid into place and the torque tube is attached to the control stick with the required hardware.

Of course, I should point out that each aileron should have been attached to each respective wing panel first. But, in order to transport the wings on a flatbed trailer, it is easier to transport the wing panels sans the ailerons because each aileron has its attached control arm attached already, and it

protrudes below the aileron. As each lower wing is slid into place, both the forward spar and rear spar have to be secured with the appropriate hardware, all the while trying to secure the torque tube to the control stick! It's a dance that can be delicate, a breeze, mind-boggling and frustrating, all at the same time. There is not a lot of room for pushing hardware through holes; it is a job better suited for small thin hands!

We enjoyed that "pleasure" while installing the upper wing panels. To ensure that complete access is available for the job at hand, all the side panels and bottom panels have to be removed first. After the lower wings are securely in place, then the panels are replaced. Thank God for Camloc ¼ turn fasteners!

Once all four wing panels are in place, attaching the struts, flying wires, and landing wires is a breeze. The next task would be to do an Empty Weight & Balance calculation, plus other required mathematical calculations in order to satisfy the FAA. Once I get my Airworthiness Certificate, the Skyote will be flying, finally!







# 1929 EAA Ford Tri-Motor

EAA's Ford Tri-Motor (NC8407) was manufactured on August 21, 1929, and was purchased by Pitcairn Airways which flew it up and down the East Coast of the United States in the late 1920s and early 1930s. Eastern Airways, the forerunner of Eastern Airlines, subsequently purchased Pitcairn Airways. In the mid-1930s, the airplane was sold and moved to Cuba, where it flew for a Cuban airline for several years and also spent time in Central and South America. In the 1940s, the airplane was flown in Idaho and Montana, transporting smoke jumpers who fought forest fires. At that time, the large 450 hp engines were installed. The passenger door was also converted into a squarejumping threshold, so that jumpers' equipment would not become snagged during an exit. The airplane was also used as a borate bomber that dropped chemicals on forest fires. In the 1960s, the airplane was part of an operation that flew around the country, offering rides to the public. In 1973, the airplane was at a tour stop in Burlington, Wisconsin, when a severe thunderstorm moved through the area, lifted the plane 50 feet in the air, and smashed it to the ground on its back. The airplane, which broke into three pieces, was considered a total loss

EAA purchased the Tri-Motor from an insurance company shortly afterward and began the long process of restoring it. The 12-year restoration was completed in 1985. For the next six years, the Tri-Motor was on display at the EAA AirVenture Museum in Oshkosh, Wisconsin, and was only flown occasionally. In 1991, the airplane began regular passenger flights once again, based from the museum's Pioneer Airport. In preparation for her 75th birthday, during the winter of 2003-04, the airplane received a "makeover" through the kind generosity and many hours of hard work by Gulfstream Aerospace Corporation in Appleton, and EAA's own team of mechanics.
