Notes from our President Jim Kessler



Happy Fall. This is the best flying weather, so enjoy. Get out there and put some time on those wings. I did in the Breezy.

The Breezy: The story behind the Breezy goes like this:

Warren Cox built it. The chapter had a meeting at his hangar to see what he had built about two years ago. Warren has been a member of our chapter for years.

As Warren completed the Breezy, he lost his medical and was unable to fly his creation.

He has tried to sell it for the last couple of years, but the Breezy market is small and the unflown Breezy market is considerably smaller.

Warren offered to sell the Breezy to the chapter at an exceptionally reduced price, but the problem is the chapter can't own an aircraft that is actively flying. So we made a deal. A member of the chapter (me for now) will fly the Breezy for Warren while he remains the owner, and he will then sell it to us at the reduced price once we have flown out the 40 hours. We can then find a home for it at the normal price. It is a definite win-win.

We inspected the Breezy and found the workmanship to be exceptional. (Warren wanted me to be sure I credited Jason Manzanares for his considerable support during the build process.) The board decided to enter into the deal with Warren. We have now started flying the Breezy and will continue to fly off the 40 hours.

So, that is the story of how we became involved in flying a Breezy. Check the story of its first flight on page 14.

LOEFI: I will let others comment on LOEFI, but I will say it was an awesome event. I am so impressed with the chapter members' commitment to the flyin. There were so many heroic efforts, I would be remiss trying to recount them all. I have never been in an organization with such committed volunteers. Notes from the Editor George Young

As our president observed in his <u>Notes</u>, this is the best weather of the year, the time of year to "Just Go Flying". Last week I took advantage of that idea like I haven't in years past.

Airplanes were always in my field of interest. This despite growing up far away from any flying activity or having contact with anyone who was flying airplanes, full size or model. Although my stepfather and an uncle had flown in WWII, they Never Talked about their experiences. But when I got the opportunity to learn to fly, I took it.

Aside from the intellectual and physical challenges of flying and the feelings of accomplishment, I discovered on my first 'free' solo cross country that I could go places ... I flew home for breakfast one Sunday morning from Colorado Springs to my home town in western Kansas (town of Hoxie, closer to the Hill City VOR than Hill City; maybe you've been there?). I was back at USAFA by mid-afternoon. Wow, that opened up a whole new world.

So that became my Reason to Fly – to Go Places. (It helped that I learned to fly in a T-34, so I had the 'complex airplane' endorsement from the start and could fly the the faster airplanes like a Comanche 250, Mooney, C-182, each a Go Places airplane). Thus, other than checkouts and proficiency flying, cross countries became my main flying activity, such as –

- From Wright Field, OH to Kansas for a weekend with my girlfriend or to Muscle Shoals, AL for a friend's Mother's Day lunch (T-34).
- From Isla Grande airport in San Juan, PR to Saint Thomas, VI because I could (C-172).
- From Edwards AFB to Eglin AFB (by way of Hoxie) with 8 and 10 year old kids (Mooney).
- From Manhattan, KS to Hoxie in an .. Aeronca Champ (watching the semi-trailer trucks on I-70 pass us).
- Ultimately, with Pat, our A-Cross the Country, from Newport News, VA to Oakland, CA and return (C-172, had scheduled in an Arrow but the wing spar AD quashed that).

You ask, how does all that relate to "Just Go Flying"? All of that previous flying was with rented airplanes requiring advanced scheduling, sometimes limited availability, and it was a bit costly. Now, sharing ownership with others in the High Desert Flyers Association, I have easy access to our RV-12. I can go to the airport, open the hangar, do a preflight, fire it up and taxi to the runway, and ... Go Flying, and much easier on the budget. So last week, I did just that and had a ball. I wasn't going anywhere nor was I practicing maneuvers. No, I was – Just Flying –, getting to know the airplane and the airplane getting to know me.

If you would like to see more detail, go to <u>Just</u> <u>Go Flying (George</u> <u>Young)</u> on our web site. There you will find a larger image, and one that is expandable.

You may also download the GPS Track File (KML) which you can load into GoogleEarth to play with it, and even "fly it" on GoogleEarth.

- For half an hour I just flew slow, in the 50 knot range, turning left then right, going in circles, steep and shallow, maintaining altitude (mostly).
- While "becoming one with the plane", I was looking at ground features of the Rio Puerco valley, marking a waypoint over some interesting formations to explore some day, or tracking a road up out of the valley convinced that Pat & I had explored that road until we could go no further.
- Heading back to KAEG, I noticed a 1200 fpm rate of climb; I hadn't touched the throttle and the plane's attitude hadn't changed. Ah ha, a thermal, let's check this out. Circling right (I had felt the right wing 'bounce') I tried to stay in it. Nope, try left, ah ha back in it, out of it again, circling we were back in it. And we worked our way up from 6500 to 9500.
- Ok, time to head back to 'home plate'. Back in the pattern, do a couple of short/soft field landings (not much difference between them in the RV-12), and taxi back to the hangar. Wahoo! (And what a way to finish unwinding from LOEFI!)

Many of you have already gone flying like this and are familiar with such joys of flight. If you haven't "gone playing" like I did, perhaps this will embolden you or attract you; it seems that I just had to stumble upon it. And for those working towards –your– days of enjoying the freedom of flight, to "Just Go Flying", put this on your Bucket List.

Flying the Breezy Jim Kessler

First Flight

We finally got the Breezy in the air on September 25th. It was a perfect morning. The wind was very light and there wasn't a cloud in the sky. It was a great morning for a test flight.

Lee Otto and I were there first, but Mark Sturm and Warren Cox, the builder, arrived shortly thereafter. Joyce and Art were there in time to help with the preflight. We had to replace the battery and fill the fuel tank, but other than a pre-flight it was ready to go. We rolled it out and started it with no problems.

Spoiler alert, the first flight went off without a hitch. Warren has done a superb job building the airplane and it flew exactly as an airplane should.

I taxied it out to runway 4 and did some power checks on the taxi.

The Breezy, as Warren built it, has nosewheel steering and handles exceptionally well on the ground.

The runup went well, so I waited at the hold-short line on Alpha-6 for takeoff clearance. Once cleared for takeoff, I taxied onto the runway and applied full power. The plane accelerated nicely and at 60 MPH I lifted off. It took only about 500 ft, so there was plenty of runway in front of me. I stayed low and built-up speed. I had asked for a southerly departure from the right downwind, so I began a climb to pattern altitude and started the turn.

The Breezy is well named.

On the downwind I climbed through pattern altitude and continued south. The Breezy's glide ratio is about 8.5 to 1, a little better than a freight train. I wanted to get some altitude before I got too far from the field. I climbed to 8,500 feet and stayed within 5 miles of the airport by arching to the west near the Rio Puerto arroyo, heading north.

The airplane handles well. It is well balanced in the roll channel, but a bit heavy in the nose. I had it trimmed full nose up and still required strong backstick to maintain a climb at 70 MPH. Once I accelerated to 80 MPH the stick pressure was neutralized.

At the 15-minute point, I reduced power and slowed to 2500 RPM and 70 MPH. This was the engine break-in flight which required 65 to 75% power and an hour to seat the piston rings. At 8,500 feet the density altitude was 10,240 feet and the maximum power the engine would produce was 73%.

The gauges were all looking nominal, as they say. It was cool and windy, but the view was fantastic. Now I just had to keep the tower informed of my intentions and the ground crew informed of my position and the instrument readings.

After two circuits of the airport control zone, it was time to think about landing. I pulled the power back and did a power-off stall at 50 MPH.

The right wing tends to stall first. It is a very gentle stall. Then I did a power -on stall, which occurred at about 45 MPH. That seemed like a large difference, so I tried it again and it was about the same.

At this point I was about set up for a straight-in to runway 4 and requested such. Tower graciously obliged. I had planned for a low pass and then once around the pattern, but on final I noticed the fuel gauge was mighty close to the big E, so I amended my clearance to land.

The Breezy's gear lands firmly and doesn't tend to bounce. Once on the ground the aircraft seems like it was made to taxi as well as it flies.





I taxied in and shutdown. It was a most excellent day of flying.

In Sum

My thanks to the ground crew for taking notes, which is pretty much impossible in a Breezy. Warren's flying machine worked perfectly, and it was my privilege to be able to take it for its first flight. Thanks, Warren for giving me that honor.

Anyone interested in a superb aircraft that provides the best visibility you could ask for should contact Lee Otto and buy it before someone else beats you to it.

Building A Zenith CH-750 STOL with Corvair Conversion Bill Hutson

Editor: Last month I included a note "Happenings at Double Eagle II" with a photo of an airplane seen taxiing around the airport. Here is an update from Bill.



"My last update to the Chapter was late 2019, and to the left is the last picture in my presentation (*August 2019; Editor*) . Although my progress will certainly not break any records, I have made steady progress from then until now.

For those who may not remember, my project is a Zenith CH-750 STOL powered by a Corvair conversion. Using conversion parts and instructions/guidance from FlyCorvair, I assembled and test ran the engine on a test stand at the factory in June, 2019. I installed the engine onto N311WH and performed my first engine run 25 June 1923. And ... I made my first low speed taxi test on 3 September. I still have a few minor carb adjustments to make and the small task of completing the nose bowl/cowling but I am getting closer to the end of the build."
