#### Notes from our President Jim Kessler

I think the month of December is a great time to reflect on the year. It has been a good one.

Our Young Eagles Rallies have been a great success for both the pilots and the Young Eagles. We had great turnouts for each. We flew 7 Rallies and 395 kids. We averaged 9 or 10 pilots at each Rally. Chapter 179 pilots flew 460 YEs, which means some of our pilots are going to other chapters and flying

with them in their Young Eagle Rallies. That is really cool. We reached an important milestone this year for Young Eagles. We have flown 5000 YEs since the inception of the YE program in 1992.

Chapter 179 Gatherings have been well attended and informative. For me some of the highlights were the meeting at QLab, which was our most unusual field trip, visiting Emilio's Skyote last month was also exciting, and hearing about gyrocopters from Mark Wilson was enlightening.

We had four of our scholarship winners or DEAA graduates solo this year: Scarlette McIntyre, Sophia McIntyre, Becca Posen, and Mia Alderete. Mia got her pilot's license and is in Pensacola now training to become an airline pilot. We have 6 other students in the pipeline: Ashlee Simkins, Daisy Belmares-Ortega, Michael Wang, Isabella Baldonado, Ben DeGuio and Christian Guerra.

The Double Eagle Aviation Academy went well. One of our students will be this year's Ray Scholar. The enthusiasm generated during that week carries many of the participants into the aviation field. We have several graduates attending different aviation training programs including the Air Force Academy.

LOEFI was a huge success. Mike Paxson did an awesome job coordinating that effort. The activities available during the day and the aircraft displayed were exceptional. There was something for everyone, from riveting to touring the new Air Force HH-60G CSAR. The Fly-mart, the automobiles displayed, and food trucks all added to the enjoyment.

This year we put together a plan to upgrade the RAF (Chapter 179 Hangar). We have just started that adventure, but the plans have been made. The upgrades include a people door, overhead fan, a pneumatic pressure system and insulation. The door should be installed shortly.

Finally, we obtained two new projects this year. We are flying Warren Cox's Breezy to help complete the Phase I testing on his airplane, and we have the Pietenpol Air Camper project. We have flown 12 hours of the 40

hours on the Breezy. The Air Camper is sitting in Lance Hunter's hangar awaiting room in the RAF. Thank you, Lance.

When a chapter has a vibrant and active schedule, it is a healthy chapter. Chapter 179 is just that. Our board of directors has maintained a focus on aviation outreach and education, which is our mission. It has been a great privilege to work with our dedicated board of directors. Thank you for your hard work.

#### Notes from the Editor George Young

I haven't written much about flying, except recently when I expressed my enthusiasm for flying the RV-12 (Notes from the Editor, <u>October 2023</u> <u>Newsletter</u>). But this month I'll try my hand at ... talking about flying, inspired by an article in the recent NMPA Newsletter "Mountain Flying". (Perhaps you don't fly over our mountainous terrain, or plan to fly into mountain airstrips, none the less, I recommend Cliff Chetwin's article in the <u>November NMPA Newsletter</u>. And there are other really great articles.)

How about including Alternate Airports in your flight planning? Even for us VFR pilots? Here's are my stories: I've had experiences that relate (including some mea culpas, or .. don't do what I did).

- C-152, TDY from Edwards AFB, CA to Hill, AFB UT
   I had little experience flying "out west"; most of my experience was
   "back east". I've come to learn the weather is different out here, particularly when it comes to winds. So ... I left Hill in late morning thinking I could get back to Edwards that day.
  - Alternate #1: I headed south from Hill AFB and .. I noticed my ground speed was not what I expected and I would need fuel sooner than planned. After a quick check on the Sectional Chart and AFD, I headed for Delta, UT.

After refueling, I had to wait on the ground until winds subsided. In the air again it became too late to make it to Edwards by dark. So I planned a stop at Nellis AFB, NV for the night.

Alternate #2: Back in the air from Delta, with strong headwinds, I watched the traffic on the I-15 passing me. Realizing that I couldn't make it to Nellis, another check of the Sectional Chart and ... I headed for St George, UT for the night.

The next morning I made it to Edwards.

- C-172, cross country from Virginia to New Mexico
  On our first -long
   cross country together, my wife and I had reached
  Altus, OK. After a night in a motel and a delay while early morning
  crud cleared, we headed for Clovis.
  - Alternate #3: Fifty miles out, we started watching a storm that appeared to be on our planned track. As we got closer, sure enough it blocked our route to Clovis. Time to find an alternate airport. While I was checking the Sectional, Pat said "There is a perfectly good looking airport!", almost directly under us. Checking the Sectional it proved to be Muleshoe Muni, TX. Then checking the AFD perfect-

ly good airport – we landed. (Sidenote: We were visiting relatives in Muleshoe – landing there saved them a drive to Clovis to meet us.)

We continued on to Albuquerque the next day and I returned to Virginia while Pat continued travelling for her business.

- *C-172, aCross country from Virginia to California* We set out on our second leg fo this aCross the Country, from New River, VA planning to spend the night in Huntington, WV. It was late in the day, we were flying towards the sun low in the sky, and with very hazy conditions visibility was quite limited.
  - Alternate #4: Although conditions were technically VFR, we opted to not continue flying into the sun. Again checking the Sectional, we located Logan County airport along our route. We landed, closed the flight plan, and settled in for the night.

We continued our aCross The Country, west to Oakland (with another unplanned stop at Sacramento, CA to wait for fog to clear San Francisco Bay). Returning to Virginia – we made our planned stops for the remainder of the trip.

So .. winds, storm cells, visibility – three reasons that led to a landing somewhere other than the planned destination. In each case we were flying VFR, and except for the last example weather was CAVU. Also in each case we easily found an alternate airport. But as I look back, Mother Nature favored us with (generally) good weather, we carried Sectional Charts and AFDs that provided the information that we needed, and (I suppose) because I was following our planned route and doing time-and-distance tracking, we were in the ballpark to find that alternate airport. But ... had conditions been different ... ???

Lesson learned – now when I plan a cross country flight, I identify alternate airports along the route of flight, and (hopefully) will be ready for any exigency..

This has been another active year for EAA Chapter 179 (see Jim's "<u>Notes from the President</u>"). For the Newsletter, my thanks go to everyone who has contributed month after month. And TIA for your contributions in 2024.

Greetings chapter members and friends.

I hope everyone had a great Thanksgiving and got some well-deserved time off. This is a big time of the year for the scholarship team. The on-line application process for our 2024 scholarships opens on 1 January for 6 weeks. If you're less than 25 years old (or know someone who is) and interested in learning to fly or taking classes toward an aviation related degree/ certificate, I'd encourage you to look into apply-

ing for one of our scholarships. For 2024, we have budgeted for four \$2,000 local scholarships, and have our fingers crossed that EAA national may award us another \$11,000 Ray Scholarship. The biggest news from last month was that EAA national approved our nominee for our chapter 2023 Ray Scholar. Christian Guerra now has \$11,000 to apply toward his flight training!
