Preface: Since we were unable to provide Alex Martinez with any formal info on how to prepare for his trip to Oshkosh for Air Academy, he set out to document for those to follow him. Below are excerpts from that daily log. We appreciate his time and effort to do this, as will future attendees. Joyce Woods

Here is a quick recap of my experience at Air Academy:

We did a lot of activities, the best in my opinion was a helicopter ride and some welding of a metal dice block. We got to walk around the EAA museum of aviation from time to time, got to watch planes flying in, and had 2 full days on the grounds of Oshkosh. We got to meet plenty of people and schools offering information and had a good time overall.



At the Academy we also made a fiberglass clipboard, wooden wing rib, custom

wooden propeller blade. We used flight simulators and did some coding with some cool little robots. We made a small metal box held together through rivets.

Oshkosh is AWESOME. There are so many planes to see and things to do and see. There was so much that I did and saw that I cannot possibly list it all. Plus, I don't want to spoil all of the fun for everyone. The one thing I will say is that I managed to impress some military guys by playing video games.

I saw more planes around this place than I would have thought. A10 warthogs, The Ford, F22 raptors (side note. Almost broke the sound barrier quite a few times.), and many other planes doing things around here. I will say Joyce was right. There just is not enough time to do and see everything. There was this huge plane show this evening as well as smoke trails and other aerobatics. It has been a good week here. I would not regret coming here for one second.

For anyone wanting to come here on their own, or through the scholarship like I was selected for, enjoy yourself while you're here. There is just so much to see and do. This is the best place for anyone interested in aviation. I highly recommend coming here at least once in your life, even if you aren't interested in planes. This is a once in a lifetime experience.

I am happy to report I made it to Oshkosh for the first time and it was better than I could have ever expected. After a few days visiting Chicago (a first), my parents and I drove to AirVenture. Taking the shuttle into the airport Monday morning, we were amazed to see seas of airplanes covering their owners' tents below unlike anything we had ever seen before. We were told that the number of planes would continue to grow throughout the week, which continued to make us excited to come back for several days.

Over the few days we attended, we got to see planes of all sizes from the large military transport aircraft to the smallest ultralight aircraft. Even my parents, who are significantly less excited about planes, were at a loss for words with the sights, sounds, and scale of AirVenture. With so many adjectives and nouns in the English language, I ran out of words to express what I observed as each plane further inspired me towards a career in aviation.

Mission Report from Emilio Verastegui

Takeoff from KAEG was planned for around 0630 on 7/18/24.

I finally returned home from OSH and other destinations yesterday, 4 August 2024, after about 18 days!

I enjoyed myself thoroughly and managed to immersed myself in a lot of things "aviation"! While I had a great time after Oshkosh, my main desire was to attend EAA AirVenture 2024. It did not disappoint in the least!

Arriving early on the Friday before the event started was the easiest and least scary arrival into KOSH I have ever had, and that includes a miserable drive up from Chicago! As we approached the last waypoint on the arrival, Fiske, the controller asked for a wingwag, which I gave him. He acknowledged this and then asked "What runway do you want to use?" Well, that had never happened to me before! I said 36L. He said "Turn right, call the tower and have a good time!" Wow, if only it was always that easy! And to boot, I was parked very near the flight line, on row 55, in front of the Vintage Hangar! It sure beats my luck of the last few years of parking in the South 40, almost to Fond du Lac, and having to walk past all the other lucky pilots parking much closer!

As Barry Kromer mentioned, he was my co-pilot for the Oshkosh trip. We usually camp with several friends; one is an active FedEx pilot; several, like myself, are retired FedEx pilots and others are not even airline pilots. This year, a friend who is a FedEx retiree brought his three grandsons, all under 14 years of age. Everyone had a great time! There is always something to see that is new and exciting at the World's Biggest Airshow. For me, it was the chance to compare a B-52 and an Avro Lancaster from Canada that were on the same ramp. It was a very profound experience for me because it highlighted the differences in the planning and execution of the design parameters of each bomber. Each country had to maximize its aircraft, with the available engines at hand, and it showed, not only in the size of each aircraft but in their payloads. It was amazing to me.

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Of course, seeing so many homebuilt aircraft on one airfield is just mind-boggling, to say the least. There seems to be every conceivable kind and color. Overwhelming! And there are many, many opportunities for "just the right picture" and I saw many people who were trying to get that perfect shot.

I had a great time, as I do every year that I attend. I am planning to attend for several more years and I hope the excitement never subsides. I am like a kid in a candy store when I am there. It's a great feeling to be part of the richest, most exciting, and most beautiful public event in the U.S.A!

After Barry and I departed OSH, we flew up to see the Grand Hotel on Mackinac Island. The hotel was the backdrop for the movie "Somewhere in Time", and it is magnificent in its opulence! The island has a very laid back and relaxed atmosphere. One thing that contributes to that feeling is the fact that there are no automobiles or other motor conveyances allowed on the island. The preferred mode of transportation is a horse drawn buggy, quaintly called "taxis", or by bicycle. After a short, self-guided tour of the hotel, we departed the Island and flew several hours to Hyannis, Mass., via Canada and the Great Lakes, to get Barry back home. We arrived just before sunset, and what a sunset it was - magnificent. It was the most beautiful sunset I have seen outside of NM!

I spent a couple of days with the Kromers, then departed on the rest of my trip, solo. I flew west of NYC, although it was so hazy, I never saw it. I landed twice for fuel, once in Pottstown PA and also at a small airport that is adjacent to Luray Caverns in VA. Both had very cheap fuel! I parked the Bonanza at the Shenandoah Airport for two nights, visiting with some of Ann's family and cousins. I then pressed on to Knoxville to see my brother. As I flew SW toward Knoxville, a line of thunderstorms tried their best to pound me into the ground, but I beat them to the punch. I made my way to Lincolnton NC, landed, then waited for all the nastiness to pass me by. It finally did and then I proceed on to KDKX, overflying Asheville, NC along the way. After several days with my brother, I planned to depart Sunday morning, but was not able to depart as planned because the fog had settled on the island airport and was very heavy. I was delayed for 2 hours and 30 minutes! I finally departed around 1030 and found Tullahoma, TN. Barry has found a Zenith 750 project that is for sale and that he is itching to buy, so my job was to inspect it to see if it is what has been described to him. It matched pretty well, so I think Barry may be in for a treat! After the inspection, I flew on to KAEG, landing at 1937 on Sunday, 8/4/24, after several stops for fuel and one stop that had fuel, but no one there to sell it to me!

Overall, it was a very satisfying trip for me for several reasons - I felt that I was again using the Bonanza for what it was intended, I renewed many friendships, saw and learned about today's new aviation technology, and this trip reinforced the fact to me that flying and aviation in general is not only a hobby for me, it has been a lifelong passion. I would not have it any other way!

Hi George (and all others)

Oshkosh was excellent, well behaved and packed, In other words....normal.

I flew out to ABQ to fly up there with Emilio in his Bonanza. We started as a 'flight" with Kyle and Dan in the Mooney. Our first stop was SUPPOSED to be Dalhart but there was a huge storm that parked right over the airport, so we diverted to Liberal (not politically) Kansas. Went to the recommended Pancake House for breakfast and fuel and headed out to Beatrice NE our next fuel stop.After Beatrice, Kyle and Dan split off for Madison WI to meet up with the Mooney group and Emilio and I stopped at Baraboo, WI for the night at the Ho Chunk Casino and Hotel(no gambling was involved, we both have lost plenty of money on aircraft stuff, so we didn't need to give the casino any).

We flew in on the upper Fisk arrival on Friday morning about 0900local got our choice of runways(36L) and Emilio finally got the recognition he deserved and got to park in the Vintage Aircraft parking 1 airplane away from the show line directly out from the vintage barn.

The rest of the week proceeded well. Monday I took Emilio to the Piper Owner dinner for fried chicken, Tuesday Emilio took me to the American Bonanza dinner for filet mignon (well, excuse me....) and Wednesday I took Emilio to the Gallagher Insurance beer and brat fest. We took off Thursday morning, flew up to Mackinaw Island, took a horse taxi to the Grand Hotel found out that we would have needed a home equity loan and a couple of hours for lunch and took the horse taxi back to the airplane. We flew to Alpena, MI for fuel and no food since nothing seemed to be open, and about 3000' of the runway was missing due to construction. Next stop was Dunkirk NY after a flight across Canada. Emilio stayed here until Sunday and he can finish his flight home from here.

On a different subject, I have sold my Piper to my current employer, Aloft Aviation Management LLC at Hyannis, but I get to fly it when it's not being used as a trainer. win win for me.

Thanks to Emilio, I also now have the bug to build an airplane so I am in the midst of getting a Zenith 750 Cruzer project. Very early in the process, so it's a developing story. Carol's only restrictions on getting another aircraft: "it has to have 2 seats"....I'd say that's a pretty good restriction.

All in all a great time at OSH.

The NM DOT Aviation booth at Oshkosh was very well received by OSH attendees. Of course the generous donation of a bunch of free (yes free) folding chairs and a goodie bag from Ruidoso was a big draw. People could not believe there were nice folding chairs perfect for OSH airshow viewing for free. I asked that people promise they would visit NM at least once more in their lifetimes before being declared a special person and worthy of the free chair. Jeff's beautiful "Flying NM" playing on the TV monitor was also a big hit and many who had attended Ken Summer's excellent presentation on NM flying stopped by for more information. A surprising number had some kind of previous NM connection (e.g. military service or family living there) and no one commented on the purported NM high crime but rather the "Land of Enchantment" aspect. Many people asked about our famous back country flyins as well.

Many, many people stopped by the booth for flying NM information as well as what is it like to live in NM. But perhaps the most popular inquiry was about the 2025 Roswell air races. They wanted to have bragging rights for attending the very first Roswell air race event. Fortunately Greg Gibson of the Reno Air Race Association dropped by the booth and gave us a lot of information, although very little is actually set in stone as yet.

Here are some bullet points Greg gave us:

It will be officially called the "Roswell Air Races"

The target date is about the third week in September (usually Wed-Sunday)

Most but not all of the racing categories will take place with more added in the future.

The racing association has full time people in Roswell setting things up

About 70 acres of Roswell grounds have been dedicated to the racing venue

There will be many dry camping RV sites available (~1000) probably with water trucks, pump out services and porta-potties. More developed RV sites will be available as times goes on.

There will be many GA parking spots available but probably no camping by the aircraft this year The event will be live-streamed free

A stadium seating 9900 people will be completed by show time

The event utilizes about 1200 volunteers, about ³/₄ of the current volunteers expected to show up in Roswell

We will need to recruit several hundred volunteers from NM, hopefully through our EAA chapters and the NMPA

Microsoft flight simulator will have Roswell in their next release of the simulator

The Reno air races brought in over \$150 million recently to the Nevada economy so the Roswell race has a huge positive potential for the NM economy

Monitor airrace.org for updates as they develop

We understand that the NM Aviation Division will be sponsoring the booth again next year at OSH. We will have a signup volunteer list going ahead of time to help the Aviation Division staff man the booth. See you there.

Building a Pedal Plane Jim Kessler, Mark Sturm, Joe Martinez, Doug Volker, and others ???

2008 Oshkosh Pedal Staggerwing



2008 OSHKOSH PEDAL STAGGERWING, This model is a replica of the Beech Staggerwing . Thrill your 3 to 7 year old pilots with this attractive yellow and black pedal plane. It has a rotating propeller driven by an adjustable pedal crank assembly .

This pedal plane can be built from plans or kits can be purchased to build the pedal plane too. The plans include step by step instructions, full size patterns for all wood, sheetmetal parts, and dimension drawings for the steel fabricated parts. A parts list is included. A hardware and wheels kit, steel parts kit, sheetmetal parts kit, a precut wood parts kit, and decal package and more are available to help the builder complete the project.

Basic construction uses on sheet of 3/8" plywood for wings and fuselage and the engine cowl of 3/4" pine which is glued and turned to shape. Top front and bottom covers are made from aircraft grade aluminum sheet. Steering is done from a joystick that is linked to a tail wheel assembly.

The wing span is approximate 44" and length of pedal plane is 54"
