Program: Local Flying - Mountainous Terrain & Military Drop Zones in AEG Class Delta Wendy & Sean Smith, Local ATC Controllers

From Wendy: Sorry it took me so long to respond to this! We look forward to coming on the 15th for a presentation on mountainous terrain. We also have some information on new military drop zones in AEG class Delta.

About me: I am the daughter of two retired controllers now married to a controller. I have been at Albuquerque Air Traffic Control Tower since 2008. I am the community outreach representative and truly believe that having a better relationship between pilots and controllers makes it



easier for all of us. I had the pleasure of being selected as a controller at Oshkosh Air Venture this year, which was lots of fun. Sean and I have been involved in the pilot education of OshKosh since 2022. I used to run the operation rain check as well.

Sean, was born and raised in Albuquerque and has been a controller at Albuquerque En Route Control Center (ZAB) for 18 years now. He works in the southeast specialty which serves Roswell, El Paso, WSMR, Holloman and Cannon AFB, and other airspace along the Mexican border. Sean also is the lead simulation developer for ZAB.

Sean and I have two kids, we spend our off time at the soccer field, swimming or snowboarding. We live in Corrales, and Iove New Mexico.

Monthly Chapter Gatherings offer time to network, with programs centered on exchanging experiences and ideas about aviation – airplanes, flying, and flying activities – rather than the chapter business which is addressed in bimonthly Board meetings.

### September Chapter Gathering—RECAP by Joyce Woods

**Emily Sisneros**, a private pilot whose 33 year career with the FAA started as an Air Traffic Controller at ABQ, provided insight to how the FAA is integrating commercial space operations into the National Airspace System.

She currently works in the **FAA Commercial Space Office, Licensing Process and Operations** which supports and regulates the growing industry of commercial space operations.

On behalf the Department of Transportation, the Office licenses commercial launch/reentry activities and operation of launch/ reentry sites carried out by United States citizens. Their job



carried out by United States citizens. Their job is twofold:
 Ensure protection of public, property, national security and foreign policy interests of the United States during commercial launch or reentry activities
 Encourage, facilitate, and promote United States commercial space transportation

Emily reviewed examples of how the FAA manages the delicate balance of supporting new commercial endeavors while limiting their impact on general aviation and airspace. For example, she explained how TFRs were established for the first Virgin Galactic flights from the NM Spaceport and Blue Origin's launch at Van Horn, TX.

Initially, due to greater potential risk, TFRs are established with broader boundaries reflecting extra precautions. Gaining operational experience over time, the Office refines them to have a smaller footprint, active for the minimum time needed. She noted that ATC is authorized to permit IFR traffic to tactically transit the TFR during periods when launch activity is not present (such as a delayed launch).

For me, having encountered concerns the past few years from New Mexico pilots about future implications of the Spaceport's operations adding more airspace limitations for GA pilots, I especially appreciated the Office's approach to assessing needs and due diligence in implementation.

Emily reached out to our chapter earlier this year, wanting to get back involved with general aviation. She's become a great asset to our chapter! Flexible to volunteer for anything during LOEFI 2024, she found a niche helping out Bob Waters with our chapter "FLY-MART" where donated items are sold to benefit our scholarship program.

Thanks to Emily for insight on the expanding world of commercial space operations AND for your chapter involvement!

For the sixth year, Albuquerque's own **Chile Flight** formation team provided a mini airshow over Albuquerque International Balloon Fiesta opening ceremonies. Seven longtime Chile Flight members plus two guests from Oklahoma and Colorado made up an impressive 9-plane flyover for the Star Bangled Banner, followed by a 2nd pass in a starburst formation.

Fun facts over the 6 years - lots of 100LL, lots of smoke oil, and a little night time logged.

All airplanes are Van's Aircraft homebuilts - single place RV3's, tandem RV4's and RV-8's and side by side RV7's. Chile Flight formed in 2012. Since 2013, Chile Flight has helped DEAA kids learn about building a plane and working in teams by making an aileron section using Van's Aircraft project kits.

With helicopters in place (USAF, NMSP, APD, BCSO, and KOAT7), smaller aircraft began appearing as the sun rose. Not just one, *but one <u>Red</u>, one <u>White</u>, and one <u>Blue</u> Gyrocopter formed the center as other aircraft arrived.* 

The Land of Enchantment serves as a great forum for area pilots to network with aviation organizations and share their love of aviation with area aviation enthusiasts. Despite unfavorable wind forecasts, pilots arrived from Hobbs and Alamogordo plus Del Norte, CO. While LOEFI provides valuable exposure for the airport and the diverse group of exhibitors, you may not realize the extent that they help fund Chapter 179's youth scholarship program. This year, in addition to generous chapter sponsorship, the City of Albuquerque provided Porta-Potties and one live band. To quote Bob Waters, "every \$1000 in cost savings, is half of a scholarship!" A big Shout-Out to all our Exhibitors and Sponsors!

LOEFI 2024 was another great success, thanks to a terrific turnout of aircraft owners, exhibitors, chapter supporters and new and old friends. About 2000 people participated, 30+ exhibitors, 57 aircraft. Meghan Ripple (local chapter president of Women in Aviation) reported a successful "Girls in Aviation Day", held in conjunction with our Fly In, a super partnership for our chapter and our event.

At least 90 chapter volunteers included many current or past Young Eagles, DEAA students, and scholarship recipients AND their parents. In addition to the amazing thirty some Civil Air Patrol cadets and senior members managing the ramp, Scout Troop 174 helped manage auto parking, plus we had a couple VVHS JROTC cadets and one from Scout Troop 410. One awesome volunteer answered our Face-book call for volunteers out of the blue, and was great help both Saturday and Sunday!

# My Trip to New England ... Mark Sturm

end of the Exclusion Zone through the Class B airspace of four major airports. Maintaining an altitude of 1,000' - 1,300', making calls in the blind at specific reporting points, keeping an eye out for the dozens of helicopter tour operators, thinking about forced landings, all while trying to enjoy the view, made the transit go by very quickly.
