October Chapter Gathering—RECAP by Joyce Woods

Wendy & Sean Smith, Controllers at ABQ and ZAB Center respectively, shared a presentation they give at Oshkosh, "Local Flying - Mountainous Terrain".

They shared wrenching experiences from working to support pilots who got into trouble due to weather, mountain west terrain, and poor situational aware-



ness. Controllers can often help, but not always. They concluded with a list of "friendly reminders" including:

- No flight is a MUST flight
- Take time to account for additions to plane weight (passengers, baggage, etc.) when evaluating the icing threat.
- Be prepared for quickly changing weather over mountain ranges, which can drastically increase the difficulty of making a mountain pass.
- Weather observing equipment is sparse on mountains, so conditions may vary from the forecast
- Turn around if conditions are too hazardous, especially before making your mountain ascent
- File you flight plan.

Their mountain weather advice was well summarized by "*Respect the mountain, dude!*"

Wendy also shared a recent announcement of **Military Drop Zones in AEG Class Delta**. Double Eagle II Airport will be closed for military aircraft dropping equipment southeast of AEG, within the Class Delta airspace! Advisories are to be provided on the Tower frequency, 120.15 and we should hear the aircraft reporting the run in and when the drop is complete.

During these times, aircraft will be required to remain <u>east of all AEG</u> <u>runways</u> OR <u>3 miles west of all runways</u> until the drop is completed.

Oct 22 / Nov 5 Chapter Board Meeting Notes by Joyce Woods, Secretary

Your Board of Directors met October 22 and November 5 to round out 2024. Financials were reviewed. Committees reported the status of various activities.

Notably, the Board is impressed with progress of scholarship recipients and acknowledged the effectiveness of Rowan Phlieger's involvement. LOEFI 2024 was deemed successful despite poor wind forecasts, thanks to the Pedal Plane and SW Airline Ticket raffles, Exhibitors/ Sponsors and FlyMart donations. Youth registered for the cancelled October Young Eagles Rally were rescheduled for November, including several young LOEFI volunteers.

Summary of key decisions:

- LOEFI 2025 will be September 27
- DEAA will be June 2-6 with special YE flights June 7
- Young Eagles Rally dates scheduled plus a tentative Flying Start (Eagle Flight) event in May
- Approved requesting two 2025 Ray Scholarships from EAA by committing 25% from chapter funds
- Gaps in 2025 committee leadership and officer & board nominations were addressed, noting a good number of new active volunteers to engage
- Our Christmas Party planned at BJs on Dec 17. Primarily a social event, we'll continue our lively tradition with an optional gift exchange (\$20 limit) where those who bring a gift will receive a gift.
- Support to pursue preparing Warren Cox's Acro II for display at Albuquerque Aviation Academy, dependent on their active involvement.
- 2024—2025 Transition Board Meeting will be January 7, 2025. All members welcome to particpate.

Scholarships Art Woods and Rowan Phlieger

Chapter 179 of the Experimental Aircraft Association awards scholarships annually to candidates pursuing aviation education including flight training, A&P certification, or other activities for applicants intent on entering an aviationrelated occupation. Applicants must be 15 to 25 years of age and residents of New Mexico. The amount and number of grants are determined each year and contingent on available funding.

Applications for our Aviation Scholarship program are accepted Jan 1 – Feb 15 each year. A link will be posted to the Chapter's website on January 1, 2025.

Minimum Requirements:

- Be 15 to 25 years of age and a resident of New Mexico.
- **Describe your interest in aviation and your future** including your aviation goal(s), how much (\$) you are requesting, specific justification for how it will be spent, any connections to EAA Chapter 179, any aviation experience and achievements, and how you will give back to the community after reaching your goals.
- Provide a copy of an unofficial school transcript.
- **Provide at least one reference letter** (no more than three) from someone other than a family member who is familiar with your motivation, ability, and potential regarding aviation.
- An important criteria is the applicant's commitment to pursuing aviation.

Well...it all started with a conversation, "Oshkosh. or something different in 2024". Diana has always wanted to see the Spruce Goose. The decision was... the great Northwest. So, we flew into Portland and drove to McMinnville OR.

The Evergreen Museum is a beautiful facility and has a wide range of aircraft from World War I to the Space Age. Of course, the main attraction is Howard Hughes- Spruce Goose. What an incredible aircraft. We were fortunate to take a full tour with a young man whose uncle was one of the carpenters in the original construction. Be sure to take the "cockpit tour" - see picture of Diana grinning ear to ear ... just wanting to take off.



On another note, be sure to put on the Howard Hughes hat. We only learned from Lance this was an acceptable perk. One unexpected meeting was with a man named "Spruce Goose Bruce". He has written a very detailed book on the production of this majestic plane and almost every nut and bolt used to manufacture it.

Since there are quite a few <u>Van's</u> <u>Aircraft</u> in our EAA 179 Chapter, we went to the Van's factory...we knew they were closed and all staff were at Oshkosh...but we could say we had, "been there".

From there we drove to Silverton OR. Where we visited a Frank Lloyd Wright designed "Usonian" house called the <u>Gordon House</u>. (Doug worked for the Frank Lloyd Wright Foundation for 18 years). Silverton is a beautiful little historic



town. There is a great lodge there called the Oregon Garden Resort.

Though it does not relate to airplanes...the lodge and its attached Botanical Gardens are stunning. (maybe not in the winter).

Heading North we ended up in south Seattle at the <u>Museum of Flight</u>. Again, an outstanding display of aircraft from all vintages... including an SR-71. The original "Red Barn", Boeing's first factory is totally restored and shows the history of how they began. Fascinated...we spent about 6 hours there. One plane that really stood out were the "Connie" out front and the opportunity to go inside the Concorde, a 737, 777, and the 787 Dreamliner, and more. We moved on to Everett, WA, and stayed in a hotel overlooking Paine Field and the Boeing factory. The tour of the factory and the <u>Boeing Muse-</u> <u>um of Flight</u> was incredible. They take you from the beginning to the future in their presentation. They were preparing the factory to start producing the 737 Max because the factory in Renton, WA is not able to keep up with the demand. Also, saw the "Dreamlifter" used to bring in aircraft fuselages and other parts for manufacturing the 777's and 787's.





Diana has a Seaplane rating, which Is her favorite type of flying. We visited the Kenmore, WA, and <u>Kenmore Air</u> a seaplane base that delivers passengers all over Puget Sound. She could have watched them take off and land all day long...but I made her move on.



We drove to Burlington, WA and the <u>Heritage Flight Museum</u>. This was started by Bill Anders who flew on the Apollo 8 mission to the moon in 1968. He was responsible for taking the iconic photo of earth while circling the moon. (Bill Anders died in an airplane crash on June 7, 2024, at 90 years old).



On Friday August 1st we went to the <u>Seattle Seafair Air Show</u>. The Blue Angels were featured, but the day was stolen by a Bald Eagle. Two F-35's made a low sweeping pass over the crowd...not be outdone, a lone Bald Eagle majestically followed the same flight pattern of those F-35's...and the crowd went wild. Isn't the gift of flight spectacular!

Back in Oregon we visited the <u>North Plains Gliderport</u> and watched them tow several gliders and release them. Another stop, the <u>Hillsboro Airport</u> in Hillsboro, OR, is the second busiest airport in Oregon.

We visited several smaller and historic airports including Aberdeen. They had a really creative airplane "wind sculpture" there. (see photo).

It was a trip that we would highly recommend. The scenery, the small towns with their hanging floral baskets, seeing the hundreds of acres of "Monrovia" farmland growing ever variety of landscape



plants and trees. For those of you who like wine...the area south of Portland, toward McMinnville, has numerous beautiful and famous wineries. They are now calling this whole area; "the 'new Napa".

The trip was different than to Oshkosh, but very, very Fun... and so rich in aviation history.

Places we did not get to visit: Flying Heritage & Combat Armor Museum at Paine Field. Museum of Flight Restoration Center- (unfortunately closed while we were there), Port Townsand Aero Museum, Olympic Flight Museum.
