Notes from the Editor

My flying of late has been ... on Southwest. I find entertainment while flying commercial:

- Before boarding I consider which side of the route will have interesting things to see and I download the latest charts (sectional & high IFR) and weather data (METARs, TAFs, etc.) to Avare, my go-to flight planning and tracking
- Boarding, I choose a seat –not above the wing – on the side of the airplane and with a window located such that I will enjoy the view throughout the flight (and have a chance to get a good GPS signal for my Samsung Galaxy phone)...

Now comes the good part—practicing techniques of pilotage navigation and flight profile management.

- Set the route of flight to the destination in Avare. And start recording the flight.
- In the air, seek out features on the ground that would be good landmarks to use as waypoints. And like in the old days when it was a paper copy of the sectional chart (that is now displayed on Avare), I follow progress of the flight. For this flight to Las Vegas—Mesa Chivato (we flew directly over Mt Taylor), further on the Little Colorado River and Grand Canvon off to the north. Then, came a challenge for true pilotage navigation, the trackless badlands in Nevada. But ... off to the north Lake Powell, etc.
- Along the way I monitor altitude and speed (GPS ground speed) and figure and track enroute times, even how far from the destination to begin the descent to landing.
- And throughout, I learn geographic relationships while looking at amazing features Mother Nature has given us.

So I have great fun seeing the countryside from 30,000 feet and practicing pilotage navigation.






A History of Patches for EAA Chapter 179

Information for Prospective Scholarship Applicants .

Minimum Requirements:

- Be 15 to 25 years of age and a resident of New Mexico.
- Describe your interest in aviation and your future including your aviation goal(s), how much (\$) you are requesting, specific justification for how it will be spent, any connections to EAA Chapter 179, any aviation experience and achievements, and how you will give back to the community after reaching your goals.
- Provide a copy of an unofficial school transcript.
- Provide at least one reference letter (no more than three) from someone other than a family member who is familiar with your motivation, ability, and potential regarding aviation.
- An important criteria is the applicant's commitment to pursuing aviation.

Busting Rust Sean Babbitt



Busting Rust: 20 years after my certification and 16 years from last flight

Last month EAA graciously welcomed me to the Chapter 179 newsletter and let me introduce myself to the community. I asked if I could write a little bit about my flying adventure back to being a solo pilot in command and the proposal was accepted! After so much time away from the cockpit we thought it would be interesting to follow my adventure and see if I could hack it.

I discussed different pathways with various flight instructors about how many hours, what type of ground refresher, and simulator work and concluded that I probably needed an hour of in-flight instruction for every year away from the cockpit to get back to proficiency. This, of course, is based on how often I can fly and how much I can remember. But the target was set, and I was ready to get going.

The first step was to get my knowledge base back up to par and I used AOPA's Rusty Pilot seminar and online course to refresh my memory. I noticed that while many things are the same, many more things are different from when I last flew 16 years ago. One, for example, was the wide-spread use of Electronic Flight Bags (EFBs) instead of the tried-and-true paper and pencil planning (still important!). Another was the use of ADS-B in the cockpit of general aviation aircraft as the system was just under development in 2008. The courses were fantastic for distilling a lot of information into two, two-hour courses and I would highly recommend taking them even as a pre-cursor to a biennial flight review.



It was time to get back in the cockpit. As a Navy retiree I was able to join the Air Force Flying Club onboard Kirtland and get access to their fleet of T41 Mescaleros (210hp Cessna 172) and their flight instructors. After a long

wait for maintenance, my instructor, Aaron Sullivan, an Air Force C-130 veteran, was able to start my re-training. I told him that I was not in a hurry to take the aircraft solo and I wanted to take it slow in order to be comfortable in the aircraft (first), the environment (second), and the airspace (third).

Flying out of the Albuquerque Sunport was a serious shock to the system for communication and Class Charlie traffic density so navigating commu-

nications would have to come quicker than I thought. However, Aaron and I decided that we would sprinkle communications in as I could handle it while learning the aircraft and remembering how to fly.

Over the first four and half hours we did just that! We progressed through take offs, turns, slow flight, stalls, steep turns, unusual attitudes, and (yes) communications. As I type this short missive, we have a plan for pattern work, cross country trips, and then a psudo check ride on the horizon. More to come, more to learn, and more to demonstrate.



Sprinkled in with my training has been some other aspirational flying with our Vice President, Lance Hunter in his beautiful Cirrus SR22. I sincerely appreciate all the time Lance and others have donated to me as I ask questions and look to become a proficient pilot once again!
