



Program: Master Pilot Award Presentation

Art Woods will be presented the Wright Brothers Master Pilot award by Joe Kluk of the Albuquerque Flight Standards District Office. Art will also share his personal flying story, with highlights of over fifty years of flying.

The Wright Brothers Master Pilot Award–is named in honor of Orville and Wilbur Wright who were two American aviation pioneers credited with inventing, building, and flying the world's first successful motor-operated airplane. The Wright Brothers made the first controlled, sustained flight of a powered, heavier-than-air aircraft with the Wright Flyer on December 17, 1903 at Kitty Hawk, North Carolina. The brothers were also the first to invent aircraft controls that made fixed-wing powered flight possible.

To be eligible for the Wright Brothers Master Pilot Award, nominees must meet the following criteria:

- Hold a U.S. Civil Aviation Authority (CAA) or Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) pilot certificate.
- o Have 50 or more years of civil and military piloting experience or 50 or more years combined experience in both piloting and aircraft operations.
- o Up to 20 years of the required 50 years may be U.S. military experience.
- o The effective start date for the 50 years is the date of the nominee's first solo flight or military equivalent.
- o The 50 years may be computed consecutively or non-consecutively.
- o Be a U.S. citizen.
- o Have NOT had any airman certificate revoked.

Where: BJ's Restaurant and Brewhouse at Cottonwood Mall 10000 Coors Blvd NW, Albuquerque

Directions: Take North or South bound Coors Blvd to Cottonwood Mall. Take the Cottonwood Loop to the south end of the parking lot. BJ's is in a separate building.

RANS S-21 Build - Brandon Fryar



Brandon Fryar shared the story of building his RANS S-21 which began when he ordered the kit in March

2020. He built in his garage until this past fall when he moved it to the airport. A DAR granted his airworthiness certificate in April 11, 2025. By May 20th, he completed his Phase I flight testing.



He noted that there were too many "Lessons Learned" to list, but summarized as follows:

- Pace is important
- Some things aren't worth fixing
- Some things are
- When frustrated, or stuck, move on
- Seek all kinds of advice and counsel
- Pick advice that works for you, and move on
- Humility!
- Push hard, but do NOT rush
- If it ain't fitting or working, I messed up. Check again.
- If something bugging me, put it on a list
- Even headaches are progress

After all the hard work and frustrations, he expressed how much he loves the airplane and can't wait to fly it as it is intended. He also thanked the many chapter members and local builders that helped him along the way.



After the program, Brandon was presented an award from the chapter, commemorating his successful "First Flight" for N575BF, on April 26, 2025.

At the end of May, Brandon flew the aircraft well beyond the flight test area to a California paint shop! Stay tuned!



Luke Vaughn's Path

On Friday, 16May, I had the privilege and pleasure of enjoying an afternoon lunch with Luke Vaughn, a soon to be Air Force Academy Senior, our 2021 EAA Chapter 179 awardee of the EAA Ray Scholarship, and a Private Pilot. With so many Young Eagles attending our events, I am sure that some may wonder, "Is that it?" I would say to them that, with hard work, persistence, and some luck, you can achieve your dreams.

Luke Vaughn may have done just that!

He was in town for a few days to visit with family and friends and take a short break from his studies and duties at the Academy. He told me that he had, just days prior to our lunch, finished his final exams to complete his third or Junior year. He was planning to return to the Academy on Sunday night, 18 May.

He was very happy to be in town and away from the Academy for a few days. He said that he is studying engineering and it's application to A.I. He very excitedly told me about his projects and how they were being considered for possible use by the military.

He mentioned that his parents were doing well, as were his brothers. In fact, he said that his brother, who is also in the Air Force, will be going to pilot training in two weeks, after many months as a UAV pilot. Congratulations to him!

While Luke had many items on his to-do list while here in town, there were going to be several exciting happenings at the Academy during the week after his return. He was most excited about the upcoming announcement at the Academy that will determine his future. On Monday night, 19 May, positions/assignments (aka Pilot slots) for the senior class will be handed out. He said that he is fairly confident, at least 80% or so, that he will get a pilot slot.



Apparently, the Air Force now feels that there is a shortage of military pilots. Also, on Friday 23 May, the seniors will receive their class rings during what he enthusiastically called a "Ring Dance"! Luke describes it as a very beautiful and traditional ceremony that the Academy organizes for the Senior Class.

Once he graduates, his commitment to the Air Force is 10 years, as a minimum. Full retirement can be achieved after 20 years of service. Unless he changes his mind, he plans to complete his required commitment, then go to the Air Force Reserves for the balance of the 20 years, to reach full retirement. His reasoning is that he wants to go to an airline for the remainder of his work-

ing career. If he is successful in securing an airline pilot position, he can then retire with his Air Force pension *and* an airline pension. Good planning!

In early June of 2025, he has another tour of glider training, which will last about three weeks. Upon completion of that, he will have a short break and then he will go to BCT, which is <u>Basic Cadet Training</u>, i.e., he will sort of be a "Drill Instructor" for the newly arriving cadets. He is really looking forward to that he said. He will do his part to help instill in the "newbies" the proper Air Force mentality and decorum.



He was very excited about recently be-

ing able to participate in an Airshow at Davis-Monthan Air Force base, in Tucson Arizona. He and his glider group were chosen to put on an air display as part of the airshow. Now, that's impressive! He feels that there is a good chance that he will be one of the ones chosen to go to this year's AirVenture in Oshkosh, during the last days of July, to put on a similar air display. If he is chosen to go, he said that I can expect a visit from him, since I told him that I also was planning to be at AirVenture again this year. I said that I would be delighted to see him again and that I would especially look forward to the Air Force glider air display at AirVenture.

It was great seeing how far this young man has come since he accepted his Ray Scholarship. He is still the very excitable and friendly young man that we met a few years ago, but I can tell you that he has matured and is doing a lot of planning for the future. But, he is aware that many people, not just members of EAA Chapter 179, have helped him along the way. He honestly and willingly will share what he has to help others reach their aviation goals. He said he enjoys his days at the Academy and relishes all that it bestows upon him. His love of country is very apparent and we should all thank him, as we should all veterans and active duty members, for his commitment to duty, honor and country.

Wounded Bird Lance Hunter



On Saturday May 31 I noticed a yellow super Cub parked out in front of my hangar. The pilot was walking around the plane as if to survey damage. He was holding his phone up as if he was trying to get a signal. I drove out to the parked plane and met the pilot. His name was Nick and he was flying the Cub from Florida to California to complete a two day survey job, then the plan was to fly it back home to Florida.

He had just ground looped his plane that Saturday morning. The tail wheel was locked into place at an angle, so when he landed and the tail wheel touched down, the plane ran off the runway and into the dirt.





I offered to let him pull the plane up to my hangar to work on it. I myself am not a mechanic, however I explained who our EAA179 chapter was and that maybe we could find someone to help him.

After multiple Chapter Members came over to see if they could help, we tracked down a mobile A&P who happen to be on the field at that time. He knew a good tail wheel expert and the new tailwheel was order the following Monday.

Wednesday the new tailwheel showed up and was installed. After the installation we found a cracked part which kept the tailwheel spring in position. Another part was ordered.

Friday, after receiving the part replacement, it was installed and taxi tested. On to the next problem. Although the A&P's didn't find any evidence of structural damage to the wing, the fabric had been damaged. The aircraft owner flew a fabric specialist in from Florida to make those repairs. Saturday afternoon, those repairs were completed.



After being grounded for more than a week, the Super Cub took off this Sunday morning (June 8th) for California. The pilot landed at his destination in California late Sunday afternoon.

The pilot wanted me to thank all of the Chapter Members who assisted him over the past week. The pilot told me he was so glad the event happened at an airport with such a thriving aviation community and a strong EAA chapter.

Open Letter to General Aviation Pilots

Thanks to improvements in cockpit technology, pilot training, and a steadfast, industry- wide commitment to reducing accidents, the number of fatal and non-fatal general aviation (GA) accidents has been declining for more than 30 years. In fact, in 2024, we reached an important milestone—it was our safest year on record. However, we continue to experience far too many completely avoidable general aviation (GA) accidents.

As the leaders of the pilot and business associations representing every segment of general aviation, we are asking EVERY GA pilot in the United States to take a few minutes to participate in the 2025 **National Pause for GA Safety** by completing two easy steps:

- Scan the QR code here or go to GAsafe.org to begin
- Select the safety topic that most interests you and review it



You will find dozens of links to curated safety content including videos, courses, publications, and websites.

You can participate in the *National Pause for GA Safety* at home, but we encourage you to participate in groups of two or more. This program is also optimized for local aviation groups like EAA chapters, FAASTeam seminars, flying clubs, flight school meetings, and university and corporate flight departments. Depending on the topic you select, participating in the *National Pause for GA Safety* might take 10 to 30 minutes, but we believe you'll find more than one subject of interest, and we encourage you to explore multiple links.

We believe every pilot has a responsibility to themselves, their loved ones, the industry, and the public, to be as conscientious, disciplined, and deliberate about general aviation safety as possible. The simple act of participating in this National Pause for GA Safety **will** improve your safety preparedness by sharpening your focus in areas relevant to how YOU fly.




