

FAA presents Wright Brothers Master Pilot Award to Art Woods

Joe Kluk, FAASTeam Program Manager from the Albuquerque FSDO presented the prestigious Wright Brothers Master Pilot Award to member Art Woods,

recognizing his 50 years of safe flying since his first solo in an Aero Commander Lark in Billings, Montana in 1973.

Joe noted that the award recognizes individuals who have exhibited exemplary aviation expertise, professionalism, and commitment including non-career pilots. Joe presented Art with a framed certificate and his "Blue Ribbon package", a complete copy of Art's airman records.



Art then shared his flying story, starting with his Dad's passion and career selling airplanes. Art soloed at 16, got his pilot certificate just before heading to college at 18. He highlighted flying favorites including Mackinac Island, Michigan grass strip pancake breakfasts (Northport), and Michigan Air Tours. Other notable flights included a winter flight to Grants just after moving to NM from Michigan, low and slow Citabria sight seeing in NM, a smoky IFR flight in Montana, Oshkosh adventures, inspiring Young Eagles, and now formation flying with Chile Flight.

Bill Hill's Bio

Bill Hill, our program for July, has quite a career in many aviation-related fields.

Bill Hill Bio

- First solo flight made in July of 1962 at the Frederick MD. airport.
- The next year and one half were spent attending college and building time and gathering ratings.
- After a three year stint in Army Aviation, I ran a flight school near Winston-Salam NC while searching for my airline job none of which were to be had at that time.
- Signed up to become an air traffic controller which started in 1967 in Memphis TN.
- Continued building flying time in order to become more attractive to prospective airlines.
- Bounced around the ATC system chasing the better paying jobs which included moving on to various management positions all the while still looking for the professional flying job.
- Retired from my federal job in 1993 and became a full time air ambulance pilot until being hired by SkyWest Airlines in 1996 as the oldest (fifty-three years old) first officer they had yet to hire.
- All the while I pursued my other aviation passion, flying sailplanes.
- During the course of my various careers, I was involved in accident investigation (with the FAA)
 and making a video for SkyWest regarding flying in mountain wave conditions as well as being
 one of the pilots featured in the movie "Cloud Street, Soaring the American West".
- Now, after fifty-seven years with various types (and type ratings) of a number aircraft strapped to my butt and twenty one thousand hours flying time under my belt, I hope to share with you a few thoughts regarding my sordid past.

On Riding the Wind

A Lifetime of Flying by W. G. Hill

An autobiography, a memoir if you will. In any case a recounting of the life of a boy determined to follow in his father's footsteps and become a pilot. A story, comprised of a number of chapters devoted to his quest, over thirty-five years in the making, to reach what he perceived to be the pinnacle of aviation...an airline pilot.

During the course of that yearning, he would experience a few near death happenstances the first of which is found in chapter one of the book. He would use any excuse to become airborne. During a twenty-six year career in as an air traffic controller, he would have many part time jobs. A crop duster, an on-air traffic reporter, a flight instructor, a test pilot, a banner tow pilot, a fright-dog pilot, an air ambulance pilot and then finally an airline pilot.

Very early in his career, he would become enamored with gliders or sail planes, which at this point in his life would comprise eight thousand hours of motorless flight. Because of his ability of fly in harmony with the atmosphere rather than in spite of it, he was able to apply this acquired knowledge to analyze both accidents and incidents and thereby provide insight which led to a greater understanding of adverse conditions of flight which otherwise would have gone unnoticed.

After his mandated retirement from the left seat of his airliner, he went on to fly corporate aircraft as well as challenging mother nature's atmospheric conditions found in the lee of such mountains as the South American Andes as well as the Sierra Nevada range.

Of course the story goes on and there will be additional flights of fancy to be added to yet another tome to be written in the future.

Let me start by thanking the City Maintenance workers. Gavin Gallegos and his crew did such a great job

getting the building ready for us. They moved out all their equipment and literally gave us the run of the building for the week.

Thanks to Pam Kessler and Cynthia Alderete for planning the food and snacks. This class was the hungriest we have encountered, and these two ladies did a great job keeping the students satisfied.

Thanks to the team of pilots who brought their planes over early each morning for the students to observe and get some hands-on experience in a variety of cockpits. This is one of the most-loved parts of the week.

All of the presenters did a fantastic job explaining different aspects of aviation. Art handles the Young Eagles, which is complicated every year by pilot schedules and student schedules. Thanks to all the Young Eagles volunteers and a special thanks to Mark Wilson for stepping up during the Rally to take an extra flight even though it interfered with his plans that day.

All this in one week.

The critiques are in, and the results were good:

- The week met my expectations: 90.83%
- Instructors were knowledgeable about their subjects: 98.33%
- There were enough fun, hands-on activities: 87.50%
- I expect to use something I learned: 98.33%
- Overall, this session was worth my time: 95.83%
- How likely would you be to recommend a future DEAA to a friend?: 89,20%
- Every year the favorite part of the week is building the wing section.
 That's true again this year.
- To improve the week we need more hands-on activities. This is also a standard request.

 Other comments were thanks for the week, and the lunches were good.

In response to the critiques:

- There is really no room to put anything else in the schedule.
- Education is work, and sometimes it is hard work. Everything can't be fun.
- We will make sure that building the wing section continues to be part of the week, and we will continue to improve the lessons we have developed. This year we broke aerodynamics into 2 sessions, and it seemed to be better received. We discussed what causes lift and then a session on how to calculate lift.
- We weren't able to get an Air Force helicopter flight for the class this year, but we'll try again next year. Hands down that was the favorite last year.

With so many selfless volunteers during the week, I obviously haven't named all of them here. I've said it many times, EAA Chapter 179 is made up of the greatest group of volunteers I have ever been involved with. It is a privilege to work with all of you, and I hope to see you again at LOEFI.

It was a gorgeous CALM day to fly to KLAM. At least seven Chapter 179 members showed up at the Los Alamos Airport Open House, June 28. Brian Morrison took off from KAEG as we pulled Art's RV-7A out. Mark Wilson joined the Mountainair (M10) Flyover parade first, arriving later in "Miss Blu". Diana and Doug Volker, Eric Achen, and George Young drove in—now that's dedication!

The creative scientist aspect of the Los Alamos/Santa Fe EAA chapter shines brightly. EAA 691 together with Airport Manager and TriPacer pilot, Gary Goddard, advertised the event as a "Science Fest". They didn't disappoint even toddler attendees, as rocket launches were continuous, requiring only a touch of a button. The airport was closed from 0900 –1000 to allow paraglider and R/C aircraft demos. On display were local homebuilts, restored aircraft, one RV8 in progress, plus all those who flew in from KAEG, Santa Fe, Taos, and even Del Norte, CO. Plus, every kid got a balloon.

And the SIMs. Skip Egdorf ran a Simulator that relies on 3 computers, linked together: one to drive realistic scenery, one to drive the aerodynamically accurate pilot control inputs via a NASA program, and hmm, what was that other one for? Beyond my bandwidth. Incredible use of technology, only to be found at KLAM. Skip said he wants to partner with other chapters on SIM software and setups. Call him!





If you fly to KLAM, heed advice from the locals on cross winds and go-arounds (NOT). I've been intimidated by the instructions I got years ago—several local reporting points identified to separate incoming and outgoing traffic. Foreflight info was simple: all arrivals are Rwy 27, all departures Rwy 09. Inbound VFR traffic is to remain 5 mi east of the airport until turning final and communicate!

Art made it easy using an intersection YUNSU, 6 miles east. It's the GPS final approach fix (not on the Sectional or IFR charts) - a good example of how an instrument rating pays off even if you don't fly IFR. However, our "visual approach" glideslope didn't come in – would have made it easy. Finally, we could see the 2 light PAPI – barely visible 'til pretty close in.

The terrain is gorgeous and intimidating at the same time. This is when you just gotta remember, it's just a runway! And long enough that you don't have to land on the first 100 ft. Allow for possible downdrafts, forget that there are buildings on short final, the runway is sloped, etc. Just look down the runway!!!

I thought about going back up there myself the next day (while still fresh in my mind) but didn't. Would be fun to do on another calm day.



Chapter Project – Corsair Pedal Plane

Again this year, the Chapter is producing a Pedal Plane to be raffled off at LOEFI.

- Mark Sturm has been leading the LOEFI Pedal Plane construction at the RAF. He has built so many jigs for building the little Corsair his new nickname is "jigernaut". (like astronaut in another capacity) These necessary tools he has built for the kit assembly are so finely constructed...they could be interior sculptures or furniture.
- We are glad Joe Martinez is feeling well enough, (bad back), to help in the build also...his nickname is the "problem-solver".
- Then there is Doug Volker...also known as "gluefinger and sandman" for his ability to get wood

glue all over his fingers and sanding plane parts.

Also, a BIG Thanks to Mike Paxson, who we will nickname "3D Man".

Mike is a creative genius when it comes to 3D printing, He is in the pro-



cess of printing the radial engine and the instrument panel for the Corsair. His expertise will make this plane much more authentic...rather than using the printed paper versions that were sent with the kit.

The seating area was measured today by *House of Covers* who is constructing the leather seat back and seat cushion. (we do not want our young pedaler to get seat burn!)

Attached are several photos of the current stage of the build, as of 6-23 -25. Next steps: attachment of the wings and pedal assembly. Then paint!

The goal is to have the plane completed by July 31 to showcase the Corsair at several car dealerships, who will participate in our "Fast as Flight" car display at LOEFI.




