Jim Kessler presented his R&R (Removing and Replacing) canopy project on his RV-6.

To replace a canopy it is necessary to start from scratch and fit the new frame to the aircraft. Then you fit

the new plexiglass to the frame. You need lots of clamps. Like so many projects, you will require several shipments from Vans.

Pictured (right) is the frame on a table made from sawhorses and the plywood from the crate in which the frame was shipped.





You drill the new plexiglass to the new frame. Then you add the skirts to the cano-

py and refit them to the airplane. This requires precise drilling through the plastic into the tube of the frame.

This picture (left) depicts one of the many fittings of the canopy to the airplane. It also

to the airplane. It als shows lines that were used to trim the aluminum of the skirt.

You trim up the extra aluminum and paint. Use the plastic coating provided by the canopy manufacturer to protect the plastic during painting.

Then you put it on your airplane and go flying!



Notes from experience:

- Building airplanes is a perishable skill!
- Read the instructions from Van's and from others builders.
- The RV-6 canopy frame from 20 years ago is not exactly the same as the RV-7 canopy frame. Mistakes are inevitable. The trick is fixing your mistakes without losing the intent of the design. (Is it structural or cosmetic)
- Proper tools are a must.

REPORTS FROM OUR SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS

Ray Scholar

Gabe Pohl, who was awarded the Rich Richter Memorial Scholarship, and whom you've met at many Chapter Gatherings, whilst a volunteer at Chapter events, and a student at DEAA 2024. He has been selected as the Chapter's 2025/2026 Ray Scholar. He will receive \$12,000 from Chapter 179 and the Ray Foundation.

He has chosen to do his training at Del Sol Aviation at Sunport. And his instructor will be none other than Jocelyn Munoz, a 2025 Reimer Memorial scholarship recipient. She earned her tailwheel endorsement and her CFI rating this summer. We're very excited to see our scholarship recipients moving ahead in the world of aviation!

2025 Scholarship Recipient

Stephan James, recipient of the Jay Schmitt Memorial scholarship, was awarded a Civil Air Patrol (CAP) "full ride" through their WINGS program to earn his private pilot certificate. Stephan is a DEAA graduate, DEAA volunteer and a LOEFI volunteer (both for Chapter 179 and CAP marshalling airplanes). We're proud of his latest achievement!

AND A STORY — Journey to Cross-Country Solo

In May of 2024, at the age of 15 as a freshman in high school, I began to

pursue my private pilot's license at Bode Aviation at Double Eagle II Airport in Albuquerque. It was awesome to start my journey of getting my license this young, and in fact, I was too young. I was happy with my instructor, and he laid out my Part 61 training plan. But I only ever got four lessons with him before he left Bode

I was now onto my second instructor, and my training was stretched out so much that I was flying only



about once a week, which wasn't enough. But slowly, I started progressing and learning how to fly the Cessna 172 as I went into my sophomore year of high school. Then, in September of 2024, this second instructor announced that he had hit his 1500 hours required for the airlines, and was leaving. So I was now onto my third instructor so far. This was frustrating, but fortunately, I wasn't too far along towards my license. My 16th

birthday was coming up in December, and it was now my new instructor's job to prepare me for my first solo, which she did. I passed my pre-solo stage check on December 14, 2024, and then the big day came. On December 21, 2024, two days after my birthday, I finally took the airplane up alone. I had waited 6 months to be eligible to do this. I flew a couple of laps in the pattern, then returned to the ramp. I had soloed at 29.5 total hours.

Then, my training hit a bit of a plateau. I still had a full year until I could get my license, and it was pretty slow. My instructor also had a hiatus starting in March for about a month and a half. As the months passed, I continued to make gradual progress.

In the meantime, I applied for a scholarship with EAA Chapter 179, and I was awarded the Todd Blue Memorial scholarship on April 15. I still thank the chapter for their contribution towards my license, and I used the money to fund many flights.

I completed my sophomore year of high school, and summer had approached, so my instructor and I decided that it was time to start increasing the frequency of my flights and ramping up my training. We started doing cross country flights to Grants and Socorro, and at the same time, I began to study much harder towards my written exam. I took it quite late into my flight training, but on August 30th of this year, I passed my private pilot written exam with a proud 95%. One exact month later, on September 30th, I passed my solo cross country stage check.

As of writing this, I am preparing to fly myself to Socorro and back solo. From there, I'll just be finishing the rest of the required parts of my training until my checkride, which is scheduled for December 29th of this year. I wanted to do it on my birthday, but unfortunately, I have finals for my classes on that day.

I'm definitely a high-time student; I have about 85 hours right now, and I will probably take my checkride with well over 100. It's because I started very young and had to wait until I was legally old enough to do the specific parts of my training. If I had understood this fact sooner, I would have started flying later in high school.

I am excited to see how the rest of my pilot's license training will play out. EAA 179 has been a huge help in everything I have participated in, from the scholarship to the Young Eagles flights, to even the Double Eagle Aviation Academy.

She was a hard worker who made everything fun. This photo is from the 2016 Double Eagle Aviation Academy where she taught the traffic pattern, demonstrating with great humor as she "flew" the pattern, arms stretch as wings. She printed our DEAA books for many years and taught us the professional way to do so.

I'll always remember her telling of her first DEAA Young Eagle flight. Students plan a flight to Belen and back, navigating to a couple waypoints. Her student, one with a fun loving personality like Tandra seemed especially nervous as they prepared to takeoff. Recognizing this, she asked, "Gabe, what's going on?" He replied that he was afraid he'd get them lost, feeling pressure from his first time completing a NavLog. Good ol' Tandra lightened things up saying, "Not to worry! Skittles won't let us get lost!" From there, they had a great time as expected. And no, they didn't get lost.

We'd not seen Tandra too much after she closed her printing business and took a day job with the USPS, several years ago. Her husband, Fred Loehr said she just retired and was looking forward to getting back to flying their plane, "Skittles", the green and purple Musketeer on the ramp at KAEG. Land of Enchantment Fly-In (LOEFI 2025)

Do you know How Big LOEFI is? There are so many pieces that come together to produce our annual event.

It began 35 years ago with a gathering of pilots, airplanes, and the public at Moriarty airport. Records are missing for a few years, but in recent years it has become a fixture in September at Double Eagle II.

- It is enjoyed by pilots, some who fly in (and even camp) for the event, others who drive in to see airplanes, exhibits, and what Chapter 179 is up to these days, and all to attend seminars.
- And .. the public .. takes advantage of the opportunity to visit an airport, wander around the ramp and look at airplanes, peruse the exhibits, and .. connect a bit with airplanes and aviation through the activities created by our Members. And maybe buy something from the Fly-Mart.

Back to How Big – Preparations get under way early in the year and continue right up to The Day (and after).

- During the months before, activities include getting the city permits and scheduling inspections; publicizing; arranging for exhibitors, band, and food trucks; developing the Chapter activities; procuring long-lead materials such as signs, trophies, and materials for the Chapter activities; other details too. And this year, new features to attract more pilots the Pilot Oasis, Pilot Door Prizes, and including all pilots, fly-in, taxi-in, and walk-in, as special guests.
- Activities intensify a couple of weeks out:: finalize bands, food trucks, and
 exhibitors; develop the layout for the Exhibit Hall; gather materials and resources for the Chapter activities; coordinate with CAP and other participating organizations; assemble signs for traffic control, on the ramp, and inside
 the Exhibit Hall. And a couple of days before, clean the hangar.

Friday is a busy one for everyone, including the many volunteers that are so much a part of the operation.

Highlights of the activities: marking the layout in the Exhibit Hall; prepositioning signs, tables, chairs, and tents (including erecting the large tent for the eating area); bringing "inventory" for the Fly-Mart; setting up vehicle traffic control barrels etc; and hosting any pilots who have come to camp.

Then comes –the day– ... pulling it all together.

- Early morning: deploy signs, tents and tables (Public Welcoming, Chapter 179, Pilot Welcoming, and the Stage); this year arrange the "Fast as Flight" automobiles; position early arrival aircraft in the Showcase; exhibitors and volunteers for the Chapter Activities set up for the public.
- Then the public begins to arrive and more airplanes show up.
 - Volunteers are busy all day directing traffic into and out of the public parking area.

- Ramp directors are positioning airplanes in the Showcase or directing them to visitor tiedowns while CAP cadets perform the aircraft marshalling role, insuring safety as they direct arrivals to a parking spot and as they depart.
- Volunteers at the Public Welcome table greet arrivals, offer them an overview of the Fly-In, and generally monitor the flow of people.
- Volunteers at the Chapter 179 table engage the visitors, telling them about EAA and Chapter 179, especially about our activities: Young Eagles, Double Eagle Aviation Academy, Flying Start, and our Scholarships. They also sell the tickets for the Raffles.
- At the Stage, the first of the bands performs for the opening ceremony.
 As the day goes on, our Master of Ceremonies makes announcements
 about upcoming activities, does occasional interviews with pilots, and
 introduces the other bands for the day.
- Volunteers at the Pilot Welcoming table take Registrations for pilots who
 have brought an airplane and Check In other pilots. Each gets a small
 'goodie' bag with information about this year's LOEFI, a magnetic business card for year's LOEFI, and other gifts. Each Register or Check In
 pilot receives tickets for the LOEFI Pilot Door Prize drawing.
- Volunteers for the Chapter Activities engage the visitors with their various activities: Pilot Experience, Builders' Corner, Kids Corner.
- The Volkers provide hospitality at the Pilot Oasis with a continental breakfast plus snacks and coffee all day. And host for the Pilot Door Prize drawing.

This is a blow-by-blow description of How Big LOEFI is for the Chapter. It is successful only through the efforts of many dedicated volunteers, Chapter Members and Chapter Friends. Some are involved in the months leading up to LOEFI, many more come out to help with setup and the activities on –the day-.

Then .. How Big? Rainy weather reduced the attendance for both airplanes and the public. None the less, we provided the community a great day to see airplanes up close and aviation-related activities & exhibits.





- 2) Mount Rushmore National Memorial (South Dakota). Yep, four presidents. Can you name them? Seven years to complete at a cost of less than \$1M.






