"I have always been fascinated flying, and enjoy the thrill of being in the air and seeing the beautiful views below (window seats are my favorite). Growing up, I wanted to be an aerospace engineer because I am fascinated that we have been able to achieve amazing feats in flight through marvelous engineering. I do not have any direct previous experience with aviation, and, up until recently, I had not been in a plane outside of commercial flights (Emilio recently generously took me and the experience



only further cemented my desire to fly and help build). I am very thankful to have found the EAA 179 Chapter and to have been given such a warm welcome into the group. Everyone I have met have been very amiable and giving. And everyone has absolutely loved planes! I am looking forward to making new friends and experiencing/learning more aviation."

Another new member in September, Garick Luechung:

"I proved my love for flying when I was about to go to college. My parents promised me a new car or flying lessons if I was awarded a full scholarship. I was not easy considering I was driving a 1986 Honda Prelude with no A/C in Florida, but I did end up choosing the flying lessons. I ended up with a commercial certificate with instrument rating in a couple of years in a Part 141 training program while going to school for aerospace engineering.

I hated engineering but somehow managed to finish the program. The airline industry was still hurting from 9/11 and I thought 10 years of military commitment was going to be too long, so I joined the Marine Corps and became a ground combat arms officer. It was on my last deployment to Afghanistan where I was conducting close air support with a reconnaissance team that I wondered if engineering was truly that bad. I left the Marine Corps after 8 years and went back to graduate school for aerospace engineering. After receiving my degree, I accepted a job with The Aerospace Corporation in El Segundo, CA. I started flying again and completed a Cirrus transition program in the busy Los Angeles airspace.

Recently, I accepted another role with The Aerospace Corporation that brought me and my family to Albuquerque at the end of July. I am still homeless but hoping that I will end soon. I plan on starting an aircraft build as soon as I have a place. I was inspired by all the active members and the youth engagement at the August meeting. I am glad to be a new chapter member and excited to help other members with their builds and community involvement."

Chapter 179 had another successful Young Eagles event on September 11, 2021. We flew 32 kids, and a splendid time was had by all. The weather was not the typical September weather, rather it seemed like early August due to the high temperatures. This density altitude problem caused 3 of the kids to decide to wait until our next event on October 16. We have two more events on that one, October 23 and November 6. That will wrap up the group events for 2021. Individual Young Eagles flights are still encouraged.

As most of you know, Carol and I are moving back east to Cape Cod. We will be moving fairly soon, so we may not be here by Thanksgiving. That said, I would like to thank everyone who supported the Young Eagles program and I am sure all of you will continue to keep the kids flying. I have to really give a shout out to Todd Blue. When I eased into the coordinator's role, I had no idea of

the work that was required to run this program as smoothly as he ran it. Since the youngeaglesday.org online registration program rolled out, it made the organization and logistics quite simple. Todd didn't have that available, and he needs to be commended for manually doing all the work that now is computerized.

I have a Young Eagle experience from John Lorenz for this month's member experience:

"The certificate from EAA HQ says I have flown 100 Young Eagles; seems unlikely at one or sometimes two per hop, but maybe. The kids come with a variety of attitudes from overconfident to relatively timid, some don't want to touch the controls in flight, others can't get enough and would happily put the airplane into an unusual attitude if allowed to. I've had to firmly tell a couple of the latter that only one of us, *me*, can fly during takeoff and landing. But both types depart smiling. They always want their photos taken with the plane, and I try to get them to adopt an aviator's pose, with one foot up on a tire, maybe leaning over with an elbow on the raised knee; it makes a better story when they show the photo around to their friends.

Two remarks from my passengers stand out. One was a youngster who, on seeing the ranchland around his home from the air for the first time, said, in hushed and awed tones: "This is amazing..." Made my day.

The second line requires a bit of a build-up to set the context. I used to give Young Eagle rides in an Interstate Cadet that had no electrical system and that had to be hand propped to start. To keep the youngsters out of harm's way, I would strap them into the rear seat before starting up. I would then have a rated pilot to sit in the front seat to hold the brakes and operate the engine controls while I did the propping. That pilot would then get out and I would strap in for the flight. Once, as the other pilot stepped out, the youth in the back seat asked with trepidation: "Do I have to go by myself?"

Two happy Young Eagles a brother and sister two-fer, after a YE flight at Belen Regional. The Super Cruiser is certified as a three-seat airplane, with a "two-person" bench-style back seat. That seat has only one seat belt for both passengers, and they had better be relatively small. It helps to bring cushions for the shorter kids, otherwise they have to fly by instruments.

Scholarships Mark Sturm – Scholarship Coordinator



Greetings chapter members and friends. I hope most of you were able to join us at LOEFI a couple weeks ago. It was certainly great to be back at a Fly In after missing our New Mexico show in 2020.

I was able to spend some time at the show talking with our 2021 Ray Scholar nominee, Luke Vaughn. As background, Luke is a Senior at Volcano Vista High School active in their Air Force JROTC program, an Eagle Scout, and very much interested in becoming a pilot.

He applied for one of our chapter scholarships back in January 2021, and while he had excellent qualifications and references, he was not chosen because he was selected for a summer Air Force Junior ROTC scholarship at the University of North Dakota (an excellent program and a major honor to be selected). This was to be

a two-month emersion into general aviation and culminate with a Private Pilot's License (PPL)!

Unfortunately, the fires in the west this summer resulted in many IFR days that grounded the PPL program. Additionally, several of their flight instructors were offered flying jobs outside the university, so there was an instructor shortage. Because of these issues Luke returned to Albuquerque having completed his first solo and the written exam, but without his PPL.



Our chapter acknowledged his passion for becoming a pilot and has nominated Luke to be our 2021 Ray Scholar. If all proceeds well, we hope he will be back in the cockpit again very soon. He plans to complete his training with Bode at Double Eagle, so if you see him out preflighting some morning, stop by and say hi. Here he is trying on my Velocity for size at LOEFI. Aviation and Education Foundation Attends EAA Chapter 179 Fly-in

The Aviation and Education Foundation (the Foundation) participated in the EAA Chapter 179 Fly-in at Double Eagle Airport in Albuquerque. The event was well attended, which meant a steady stream of interested families visited our booth throughout the day.



The Foundation's booth offered a number of hands-on activities such as: a ping pong ball demonstration of Bernoulli's principle; a wind tunnel disc experiment; an angle of attack lift demonstration; and a radio-controlled flight trainer. The booth also featured two jet engines on display and a rotational cutaway from a B-17 engine (Wright R-1820). The cutaway is an ongoing project meant to demonstrate the incredible engineering of the

era prior to jet engines. Not only is the cutaway a snapshot of history, but it is an incredible opportunity to experience rotational gears inside the engine firsthand.

The Foundation's founder and CEO, Bill Weber, built all of these exhibits with the help of other volunteers. The exhibits are meant to foster an interest in the science behind aviation. Bill feels that educating others is a collaborative experience and welcomes partnerships. The Foundation has many opportunities from novice to professional.

The Foundation provides on-going classes on Flight, Rocketry, Energy and RC Airplane Flying for K-12. We also have opportunities for those interested in projects such as the Wright R-1820 (B-17) cutaway.
